The current mandatory arbitration bill introduced and supported by forward thinking legislators was well crafted to help us to fill the ongoing need for more providers. We are not there yet, as we need more healthcare providers.

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Should Bill 112-36 be passed into law, those specialists and our island providers will be forced to reduce or eliminate such treatment and access. The ultimate losers, should Bill 112-3 be enacted, will be the patients who we will be unable to continue to treat.


We urge you to not repeal the arbitration law; it has helped us help patients.
