Bill 112-36 has been a contentious bill pitting medical professionals against consumers who rely on their professional expertise and skill to ensure that they survive any medical procedure. When going into surgery I must decide if I should sign an informed consent form about the procedure and that my doctor will be harmless from litigation. I would ask at this moment "what if I refuse, will my doctor decide not to continue with the procedure?" That puts both the doctor and I in an untenable dilemma. Nevertheless, I sign it anyway, because I truly believe that the doctor is the Good Lord's instrument, and no matter the outcome, His will be done.

I support Bill 112-36 because it brings "common sense" into the equation of removing conflict, forcing doctors to support or not support their colleagues when such a bill like this is before the

At the same time, this magistrate, thoroughly studying the evidence, ensures doctors under scrutiny do not suffer from frivolous suits. It is for this reason, and for removing the burdensome financial requirement that; as it stands, penalizes the consumer, preventing pursuing redress for a real or perceived injury. This burden, Mr. David Lubofsky carried. with the death of his son. Thank the Good Lord for using Mr. David Lubofsky as an instrument of His mercy, giving Mr. Lubofsky the persistence, bravery, and fortitude to continue his quest resulting in the drafting of Bill 112-36.
