**Re: SUBSTITUTE BILL NO. 55-36 COR – An Act Making Appropriations for the Operations of the Executive, Legislative, and Judicial Branches of the Government of Guam for Fiscal Year Ending September 30, 2022, Making Other Appropriations, and Establishing Miscellaneous and Administrative Provisions**

Dear Madame Speaker,

Transmitted herewith is Substitute Bill No. 55-36 (COR), now *Public Law No. 36-54*, which I am allowing to lapse into law without my signature.

It is the Legislature's duty to set annual appropriations so that the government of Guam can provide critical services to our people. In passing Substitute Bill No. 55-36 (COR), the Legislature has satisfied its duty, but unfortunately, specific provisions of the Bill are concerning, especially considering we are still dealing with a global pandemic that has affected almost every aspect of our lives, including our financial state. However, taken as a whole, we will make this budget work as we have done with other budgets since taking office.

Our proposed budget included revenue projections we believe are reasonable given our island's present circumstances, accounting for reduced tourist arrivals and increased federal spending, both in military projects and aid designed to address the adverse effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. We welcome the increased appropriations to certain agencies, including the Department of Revenue and Taxation ("DRT"), which acknowledges the agency's criticality and its broad impact on government operations and services, including business and driver's licensing, tax collection and refund processing, insurance, and banking regulations. However, given the projected Business Privilege Taxes ("BPT"), other agencies, many of which are also tasked with providing vital services during this difficult time, should have been granted enhanced appropriations. Simply, the Legislature could have, and should have, done more.

Modernizing government pay structures and paying workers their due compensation have been my Administration's top priorities, which is why I previously directed the Department of Administration to update pay plans for nurses, educators, and law enforcement officers. As you know, I approved the first pay adjustments in this series on June 18, 2021. As a result, our nurses have received a fifteen percent (15%) base pay increment, in addition to a separate agency differential rate. Under my transfer authority, I funded these pay adjustments for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2021, and on July 15th, I wrote to the Budget Chair to request funding for these pay adjustments in Fiscal Year 2022 and subsequent budgets. Unfortunately, Substitute Bill No. 55-36 (COR) did not accommodate my request. Senator Mary Torres, who has continued to advocate for Guam's nurses, also proffered amendments to fund these approved pay adjustments in this Bill.

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However, certain senators did not support this effort. As a result, agencies must now use funds within their appropriations to cover the pay adjustments, which requires them to divert financial resources from other important operational requirements.

I have consistently objected to legislation that imposes fines on government employees, in their personal capacities, for failing to meet certain reporting deadlines. These fines do little to ensure that meaningful reporting is conducted on a timely basis; instead, they needlessly place additional strain on employees (often directors and agency heads) to submit reports that, at times, are voluminous and redundant, and which often require input from other entities. The provisions impose these fines regardless of the cause of the delay, and provide no recourse for employees who cannot submit such reports timely, through no fault of their own. These provisions are, on their face, punitive in nature and inherently unfair.

This bill further includes an amendment increasing the Fiscal Year 2021 Budget Act's provision for tax refunds to reflect and lockbox an anticipated \$20 million surplus rather than simply agree to my administration's request to increase the provision. This measure is premature at best and reckless at worst. Initial internal projections regarding an anticipated surplus should not be acted upon until reported numbers clear the audit process, which will not be completed until May 2022, at the earliest. This surplus is merely a projection until that time, and the senators are building important structures in the sand. While I understand the desire to earmark these potential funds for crowd-pleasing measures like paying tax refunds, doing so at this early juncture is simply irresponsible and likely unenforceable. The Legislature cannot appropriate this projected surplus as long as the General Fund reports an accumulated deficit. Moreover, this measure is unnecessary -- my administration has paid out more tax refunds during the current fiscal year than other administrations have managed in decades.

Finally, in a bid to restrict my ability to redirect appropriations, this budget carries an amendment limiting my transfer authority from the customary fifteen percent (15%) to a paltry five percent (5%). The purpose behind this drastic action is unclear. Since I have taken office, I have implemented strict fiscal discipline that led to stabilization of our finances, retiring the deficit by more than ninety-eight percent (98%). The Legislature's attempts to limit my transfer authority during a global pandemic are short-sighted and rash. As discussed, this authority has most recently enabled me to fund pay adjustments for our island's nurses, a measure I expect the Legislature would agree was proper, timely, and necessary given the essential role of our nurses in our island's response to the public health emergency.

Despite my stated objections, we are committed to work with Substitute Bill No. 55-36 (COR) for the upcoming fiscal year, and I will allow Substitute Bill No. 55-36 (COR) to lapse into law without my signature.





**AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE  
OPERATIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE, LEGISLATIVE,

ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS.**

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF GUAM:**

**CHAPTER I**

**GENERAL PROVISIONS**

**Section 1. Short Title.** This Act shall be known as the “**General Appropriations Act of 2022.**” Except as otherwise provided by this Act, the appropriations made by this Act shall be available to pay for Fiscal Year 2022 obligations incurred on or after October 1, 2021 but not later than September 30, 2022. If any appropriation in this Act is found contrary to federal law, all other portions of this Act shall remain valid.

**Section 2. Estimated Revenues for Fiscal Year 2022.** Notwithstanding § 22436, Chapter 22, Title 5 GCA, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* adopts the following

23       **Section 3. Authorization to Pay and Prioritize the Payment of Tax**  
24 **Refunds.** *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* shall prioritize tax refund payments for 'A-Status'  
25 returns for tax year 2022 and prior years in an amount no less than Sixty-seven  
26 Million Nine Hundred Seventy-four Thousand One Hundred Sixteen Dollars  
27 **(\$67,974,116).**

1           **Section 4. Suspension of Two Percent (2%) General Fund Reserve**  
2 **(Deficit Reduction/ Rainy Day Fund).**

3           (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, the  
4 requirement to deposit two percent (2%) of General Fund revenues into the Rainy  
5 Day Fund pursuant to § 22436, Chapter 22, Title 5 GCA, is hereby suspended for  
6 Fiscal Year 2022.

7           Nothing herein shall prevent *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* from making such  
8 deposits into the Rainy Day Fund as deemed necessary. General Fund revenues  
9 collected in excess of the adopted revenues as the basis for the appropriations  
10 contained in Public Law 35-99 and this Act shall be deposited as follows: seventy  
11 percent (70%) of such excess revenue shall be deposited into the Income Tax  
12 Refund Efficient Payment Trust Fund of Chapter 51 of Title 11 GCA, and thirty  
13 percent (30%) of such excess revenue shall be deposited into the Rainy Day Fund;  
14 provided, that all excess revenue referenced herein shall be subject to legislative  
15 appropriation.

16           (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, the  
17 authorization contained in § 22436(a) of Article 4, Chapter 22, Title 5, Guam Code  
18 Annotated, relative to the expenditure of unappropriated annual General Fund  
19 revenues collected in excess of appropriations to liquidate obligations for refunds,  
20 earned income tax credits and prior years' vendor payables, is hereby suspended.  
21 Expenditures from the Rainy Day Fund shall only be authorized by an appropriation  
22 or appropriations by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan.*”

23           **Section 5. Revenue Collections in Excess of Quarterly Collections.**

24           (a) For Fiscal Year 2022, the Director of the Bureau of Budget and  
25 Management Research shall create a General Fund twelve (12)-month revenue  
26 budget based on the revenue estimates in Section 2 of this Chapter, relative to  
27 statistical weighing of historical collections by month, by collection category in the

1 General Fund Combined Comparative Statement of Revenues report. The report  
2 shall be submitted to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan*  
3 *Guåhan* within thirty (30) days upon the enactment of this Act.

4 (b) For Fiscal Year 2022, the Director of the Department of Administration  
5 shall submit a report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the Office of  
6 Finance and Budget on the amount of quarterly revenue collections pursuant to  
7 Subsection (a) of this Section on the twentieth (20th) day after the end of each  
8 quarter.

9 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all funds in excess of the  
10 adopted revenue levels enumerated in Section 2(II)(R) of this Chapter are hereby  
11 appropriated to the Department of Public Works for flood mitigation measures and  
12 the improvement of roadways, highways, roads, or streets.

13 **Section 6. Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) Reimbursements.**

14 (a) Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) of all EITC reimbursements  
15 received by the government of Guam shall be deposited in the “Twenty-First  
16 Century Healthcare Center of Excellence Fund,” which shall be separate and apart  
17 from all other funds of the government of Guam, and such funds shall be expended  
18 for the costs associated with the financing, design, construction, maintenance, and  
19 related expenses of the Twenty-First Century Healthcare Center of Excellence.

20 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, there is  
21 hereby created, separate and apart from all other funds of the government of Guam,  
22 the “Twenty-First Century Healthcare Center of Excellence Fund” (Fund) to be  
23 administered by the Department of Administration, and not subject to the transfer  
24 authority of *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*. The Fund is created to provide a source of  
25 funding exclusively for costs associated with the financing, design, construction,  
26 maintenance, and related expenses of the Twenty-First Century Healthcare Center  
27 of Excellence.

1 (b) Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) of all EITC reimbursements received  
2 by the government of Guam shall be reserved in the General Fund; such funds shall  
3 be expended for the costs associated with the financing, design, construction,  
4 maintenance, and related expenses of the new Department of Corrections facility.

5 (c) Any remaining balance of the EITC reimbursements received by the  
6 government of Guam in Fiscal Year 2022 shall be deposited directly into the Income  
7 Tax Refund Efficient Payment Trust Fund of Chapter 51, Title 11 GCA, and applied  
8 to 'A-Status' returns or into a separate federal trust fund if required by federal rules.  
9 This deposit shall be in addition to and shall not reduce the amounts set aside or  
10 deposited pursuant to the provision for tax refund payments set aside in the annual  
11 budget.

12 **Section 7. Child Tax Credit (CTC) Receipts and Additional Child Tax**  
13 **Credit (ACTC) Reimbursements.**

14 (a) No less than one hundred percent (100%) of all CTC (advance and  
15 regular) and ACTC received by the government of Guam shall be deposited directly  
16 into the Income Tax Refund Efficient Payment Trust Fund of Chapter 51, Title 11  
17 GCA, and applied to 'A-Status' returns or into a separate trust fund if required by  
18 federal rules. This deposit shall be in addition to and shall not reduce the amounts  
19 set aside or deposited pursuant to the provision for tax refund payments set aside in  
20 the annual budget.

21 (b) Interest earned in the Income Tax Refund Efficient Payment Trust Fund  
22 may be used to hire seasonal employees to assist with income tax processing.

1 **CHAPTER II**  
2 **EDUCATION**

3 **PART I – GUAM DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**

4 **Section 1. Appropriation.** It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to  
5 provide a lump sum appropriation to the Guam Department of Education (GDOE)  
6 for Fiscal Year 2022. Pursuant to §§ 52101 and 52102, Chapter 52, Division 2, Title  
7 11 GCA, the sum of Two Hundred Four Million Nine Hundred Sixty-five Thousand  
8 Eight Hundred Fifty-four Dollars (**\$204,965,854**) is appropriated to the Guam  
9 Department of Education (GDOE) Operations Fund for Fiscal Year 2022. This sum  
10 is composed of One Hundred Seventy-eight Million Five Hundred Seventy-two  
11 Thousand Three Hundred Eighty-one Dollars (**\$178,572,381**) from the General  
12 Fund, and Twenty-six Million Three Hundred Ninety-three Thousand Four Hundred  
13 Seventy-three Dollars (**\$26,393,473**) from the Public School Library Resources  
14 Fund, the Guam Educational Facilities Fund, the Healthy Futures Fund, the Limited  
15 Gaming Fund, and the School Lunch/SAE/Child Nutritional Meal Reimbursement  
16 Fund. This appropriation shall be expended in accordance with the cash  
17 disbursement schedules required by § 52101(b), Chapter 52, Title 11 GCA.

26 **Section 2. Simon Sanchez High School Construction.** The sum of up to  
27 Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$500,000**) shall be allocated from the General



1 Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter for the construction of a  
2 new Simon Sanchez High School pursuant to § 58D105, Chapter 58D, Title 5 GCA,  
3 for Fiscal Year 2022. Notwithstanding any other provision of law or this Act, this  
4 allocation shall not be subject to transfer.

5 **Section 3. *CHamoru Studies Division.*** Up to the sum of Five Hundred  
6 Thirteen Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-four Dollars (**\$513,824**) shall be  
7 allocated from the Fiscal Year 2022 General Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this  
8 Part of this Chapter for the *CHamoru Studies Division* administered by GDOE for  
9 Fiscal Year 2022.

10 Funds appropriated in this Section are to be expended for personnel salaries  
11 and benefits, contractual services, professional development and training, supplies  
12 and materials, and equipment for the support and the implementation of the Content  
13 Standards and Performance Indicators for the course syllabi for the emphasis of  
14 fluency and for the promotion of the proficiency skills in the areas of listening,  
15 speaking, reading, and writing in the *CHamoru* language.

16 **Section 4. Limited Gaming Fund.** The sum of Four Hundred Forty-two  
17 Thousand Six Hundred Eleven Dollars (**\$442,611**) shall be allocated from the  
18 Limited Gaming Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter for the  
19 purposes set forth in § 5204(d)(3), Chapter 5, Title 11 GCA, for Fiscal Year 2022.

20 **Section 5. GDOE Miscellaneous Healthy Futures Fund Allocations.**

21 (a) Interscholastic Sports Fund. The sum of Six Hundred Seven Thousand  
22 Two Hundred Sixty-three Dollars (**\$607,263**) shall be allocated from the Healthy  
23 Futures Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter to GDOE for the  
24 Interscholastic Sports Fund to be expended pursuant to § 7108, Chapter 7, Title 17  
25 GCA, for Fiscal Year 2022. The allocations made herein shall be available to fund  
26 sports programs, to include the payment of head coaches, assistant coaches, league

1 fees, busing services, and other expenses normally associated with interscholastic  
2 sports.

3 (b) Health and Physical Education Activities. The sum of Two Hundred  
4 Seventy-seven Thousand Five Hundred Eighty-nine Dollars (**\$277,589**) shall be  
5 allocated from the Healthy Futures Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of  
6 this Chapter to GDOE for health and physical education programs, intramural sports,  
7 and similar activities in Fiscal Year 2022.

8 **Section 6. Guam Department of Education Alternative Dispute**  
9 **Resolution/Mediation Services.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, for  
10 Fiscal Year 2022, the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (**\$40,000**) is allocated from  
11 the Guam Educational Facilities Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this  
12 Chapter for GDOE to obtain and provide Alternative Dispute Resolution/Mediation  
13 Services to all public schools on Guam.

14 **Section 7. Textbooks and Instructional Materials.** For Fiscal Year 2022,  
15 the following are appropriations to GDOE for the purchase or development and  
16 production of textbooks and instructional materials related to specific content areas  
17 in accordance with the following terms and conditions:

18 (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the sum of One Million  
19 Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$1,500,000**) is appropriated from the General Fund  
20 from Fiscal Year 2023 revenues for Fiscal Year 2022 to GDOE for the purchase or  
21 development and production of textbooks and instructional materials related to  
22 specific content areas. The Superintendent of GDOE may, if necessary, through  
23 agreements with textbook vendors, defer payment for said materials until after  
24 October 1, 2022 but no later than December 31, 2022, with the full faith and credit  
25 of the government of Guam.

26 (b) The Superintendent of GDOE shall order materials funded by this  
27 Section for Fiscal Year 2022 no later than March 1, 2022. The Bureau of Budget and

1 Management Research shall release such allotments as are necessary to ensure that  
2 said materials are ordered by March 1, 2022. The Superintendent of GDOE shall  
3 receive said materials and distribute them to schools no later than thirty (30) days  
4 before the start of the school calendar established pursuant to § 4111, Chapter 4,  
5 Title 17 GCA. All funds appropriated for said materials shall not be used for any  
6 other purpose.

7 (c) On the first (1st) day of each fiscal quarter of Fiscal Year 2022, the  
8 Superintendent of GDOE shall provide to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of  
9 *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and post on the GDOE website, a detailed report regarding  
10 all receipts, purchase orders, and expenditures for textbooks and instructional  
11 materials. Said report shall be accompanied by the certified list of textbooks  
12 approved by the Guam Education Board and a list or copies of all purchase orders  
13 issued related to this Section. The report shall summarize:

14 (1) purchases by allotment account number, unit cost, and the total  
15 cost of textbooks or instructional materials charged against an appropriation  
16 account, the vendor, quantity, title, copyright date, and International Standard  
17 Book Number (ISBN) of textbooks or instructional materials ordered, the  
18 allocation of such books by school and grade, and whether the books are for  
19 teachers or students;

20 (2) instructional materials adopted in accordance with § 4104,  
21 Chapter 4, Title 17 GCA; and

22 (3) other information that may be useful or that is requested by *I*  
23 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* regarding the funds appropriated and authorized  
24 herein. Non-compliance with these reporting requirements by the  
25 Superintendent of GDOE shall result in the sanctions and penalties imposed  
26 by this Act.

1           **Section 8. JROTC Fund.** The GDOE is hereby authorized to expend funds  
2 from the JROTC Fund for the sole purpose of expenditures related to the operations  
3 of the JROTC program for Fiscal Year 2022.

4           **Section 9. Summer School Fund.** Pursuant to § 6119, Article 1, Chapter 6,  
5 Division 2, Title 17 GCA, which established the Summer School Fund, such sums  
6 as are necessary to fund the operations of the 2022 Summer School Program are  
7 hereby appropriated to GDOE.

8           The Superintendent of GDOE shall submit a detailed report to *I Maga'hāgan*  
9 *Guāhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guāhan* regarding the receipt and  
10 expenditure of said funds no later than thirty (30) days after the close of summer  
11 school and post the same on the GDOE website. Such report shall include the  
12 following:

- 13           (a) total revenues received, including identification of each revenue  
14 source;
- 15           (b) total expenditures and encumbrance by object classification and  
16 by school; and
- 17           (c) the fund balances.

18           **Section 10. Website Posting.** The Superintendent of GDOE shall submit to  
19 the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guāhan* and post and maintain on the GDOE website:

- 20           (a) all payments for prior year obligations to be paid by current  
21 appropriations when authorized, including the funding source to be used, by  
22 month;
- 23           (b) salary adjustments by position, effective date of adjustment, and  
24 the funding source for each, by month;
- 25           (c) mandated cash disbursement schedules; and
- 26           (d) number of FTEs, costs, and funding sources by school and  
27 division, by month.

1           **Section 11. Reports.** The Superintendent of GDOE shall electronically  
2 report the following to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan*  
3 *Guåhan*:

4           (a) Within fifteen (15) days after the start of Fiscal Year 2022, the  
5 Superintendent of GDOE shall provide a copy of the GG-1 or contract of  
6 employees hired for School Year 2021-2022.

7           (b) Thirty (30) days after the start of Fiscal Year 2022 and monthly  
8 thereafter, the Superintendent of GDOE shall provide a copy of the GG-1 or  
9 contract of each employee hired to fill any vacancy or new position.

10           (c) To the greatest extent possible, all procurement documents  
11 related to the construction of the new Simon Sanchez High School within ten  
12 (10) business days following the end of each quarter; provided, that all  
13 included documents are legally permitted to be made public in a manner that  
14 does not violate local or federal laws or procurement processes.

15           (d) A quarterly update of the Simon Sanchez High School rebuild,  
16 to include a listing of projects awarded, projects that have been put out for  
17 bid, a detailed ledger of the expenses for the rebuild, and the current status of  
18 the rebuild.

19           **Section 12. Utilities Reduction Incentive.** Each school principal of GDOE  
20 is encouraged to practice energy conservation within their respective schools to  
21 include use of solar energy. Principals are authorized to seek alternative energy use  
22 and shall seek guidance from the Superintendent of GDOE for the implementation  
23 of such. Any school whose principal and staff are able to reduce annual utility  
24 consumption by at least fifteen percent (15%) of the school's prior annual billing  
25 measured each quarter for each utility type shall have that dollar value of savings  
26 transferred from the utility pool to their respective school to supplement the needs  
27 of that school, which amount shall be available to be spent to support school

1 activities for students and staff. The savings shall be available to the school within  
2 sixty (60) days of the close of each quarter.

3 **Section 13. Cost Savings Incentive.** The Superintendent of GDOE is  
4 encouraged to implement a Cost Savings Plan to include, but not be limited to,  
5 consolidating programs and entities, maximizing student-teacher ratios, and  
6 practicing energy conservation. If the Superintendent is able to implement any cost  
7 savings within the GDOE authorized appropriations level, the Superintendent shall  
8 have that dollar value of savings available for the payment of prior year obligations  
9 and the purchase of supplies and materials.

10 **Section 14. Local Funds Reimbursement.** Funds appropriated to GDOE in  
11 accordance with the appropriations to GDOE in this Act shall not be used to pay for  
12 federally-funded program activities and expenditures, unless such payment is  
13 specifically authorized by Guam statute or unless such payment is made pursuant to  
14 grants that require that local expenditures be made prior to receiving federal  
15 reimbursement. The Superintendent of GDOE shall submit a quarterly report within  
16 thirty (30) days after each quarter to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, *I*  
17 *Maga'hågan Guåhan*, and the Office of Public Accountability, in a Microsoft Excel  
18 file and written report, of all local funds expended in Fiscal Year 2022 for federally-  
19 funded programs. The report shall contain the details of such expenditures by object  
20 class, the number of FTEs working in said programs, the amounts reimbursed by  
21 federal funds, and the amounts that have not or will not be reimbursed by federal  
22 funds. Said report shall cite the authority to expend local funds for federal programs,  
23 shall name the certifying office, and shall give the date of every expenditure.

24 **Section 15. Exemption from BBMR Allotment Release Control.** § 1303  
25 of Article 3, Chapter 1, Title 5 GCA shall not apply to the appropriations and  
26 allocations to GDOE in this Act. GDOE may draw against its respective  
27 appropriations as needed to meet its obligations in accordance with a drawdown

1 schedule that GDOE shall submit to the Director of the Department of  
2 Administration and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than October 31,  
3 2021. Such drawdown schedule shall be detailed by fund.

4 Within ten (10) days after the end of every quarter, the Superintendent of  
5 GDOE shall submit to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* a written report  
6 detailing the amount of cash received by GDOE from the Department of  
7 Administration for the preceding quarter, compared to the quarterly drawdown  
8 schedule identified in this Section for Fiscal Year 2022 detailed by fund.

9 **Section 16. Budgetary Transfer Authority for GDOE.** The Superintendent  
10 of GDOE may transfer funds from the appropriations made to GDOE among object  
11 categories. If a surplus in funding exists within the appropriation for increments and  
12 promotions and reclassifications, such amount may be used to support the payment  
13 of prior year obligations.

14 **Section 17. Authorization for Prior Year Obligations.** The appropriation  
15 made in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter may be used to support the payment of  
16 prior year obligations; provided, that it does not affect the operations for Fiscal Year  
17 2022.

18 **Section 18. GDOE School Grounds Maintenance.** The sum of Three  
19 Hundred Eighty-five Thousand Twenty-two Dollars (**\$385,022**) is allocated from the  
20 Guam Educational Facilities Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this  
21 Chapter to GDOE for school grounds maintenance for Fiscal Year 2022.

22 **Section 19. Payout of Bonuses, Rewards and Incentives Program.** The  
23 sum of One Million Dollars (**\$1,000,000**) is allocated from the Fiscal Year 2022  
24 General Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter for the payout  
25 to the teachers, school administrators, licensed healthcare professionals, and  
26 employees in critical positions under Special Education employed with the

1 Department of Education who are eligible under the *Bonuses, Rewards and*  
2 *Incentives Program* pursuant to § 5121, Chapter 5, Title 17 GCA.

3 **Section 20. Merit Bonus.** The sum of Three Million One Hundred Thousand  
4 Dollars (**\$3,100,000**) is allocated from the Fiscal Year 2022 General Fund  
5 appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter for the sole purpose of funding  
6 the payout to Guam Department of Education employees who are eligible to receive  
7 their Merit Bonus pursuant to § 6203 of Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4 GCA.

8 **Section 21. Salary Increase.** The sum of One Million Dollars (**\$1,000,000**)  
9 is allocated from the Fiscal Year 2022 General Fund appropriation in Section 1 of  
10 this Part of this Chapter for the sole purpose of funding the payout to Guam  
11 Department of Education employees for salary increments.

12 **Section 22. Adjustments to Nurse Professional Pay Structure.** The sum of  
13 Eight Hundred Seventy-one Thousand One Hundred Ninety-seven Dollars  
14 (**\$871,197**) shall be allocated from the General Fund appropriation in Section 1 of  
15 this Part of this Chapter for the sole purpose of funding the Nurse Professional Pay  
16 Structure in Fiscal Year 2022.

17 **Section 23. Menstrual Hygiene Products for Guam Public Schools.** The  
18 sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$100,000**) shall be allocated from the  
19 General Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter to GDOE for the  
20 purchase of menstrual hygiene products for Guam public schools. All public schools  
21 on Guam that serve students in grades five (5) through twelve (12) shall provide  
22 menstrual hygiene products, such as tampons and sanitary pads, in the nursing or  
23 counselor's offices of such schools; and, such products shall be provided to students  
24 at no charge to them.





1 report its findings to the respective Academy Charter School and the Guam  
2 Academy Charter Schools Council within ten (10) working days of receipt of said  
3 invoice prior to the release of funds. If DOA fails to report its findings, the invoiced  
4 amount received by DOA shall be automatically transmitted to each Academy  
5 Charter School.

6 **Section 4.** The funds appropriated to GDOE in Section 7 of Part I of this  
7 Chapter for the purchase or development and production of textbooks and  
8 instructional materials shall also be expended by GDOE for the Academy Charter  
9 Schools, as defined in 17 GCA, Chapter 12, § 12103(b), for the same purpose.

10 **Section 5. Board Stipends.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
11 rule, or regulation, all Academy Charter School Board of Trustees members shall be  
12 compensated for no more than two (2) board meetings per month for Fiscal Year  
13 2022, irrespective of the number of meetings that a member attends in any given  
14 month. Any compensation or stipend owed to a board member for attending any  
15 board meeting shall be paid from the appropriations in Section 2 of this Part of this  
16 Chapter.



1 (a) The sum of Three Million Five Hundred Sixty-five Thousand Two  
2 Hundred Eighty-five Dollars (**\$3,565,285**) is appropriated from the General Fund to  
3 UOG for Fiscal Year 2022 for student scholarships and financial assistance  
4 programs. Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$250,000**) is appropriated from  
5 the General Fund to UOG for the First Generation Trust Fund Initiative, as outlined  
6 in Public Law 33-07.

7 (b) The appropriation in this Section is for: Merit Awards, Student Loans,  
8 the Nursing Training Program (Health Professions Training Scholarship), Jesus U.  
9 Torres Professional and Technical (PROTECH) Awards, the Access to Higher  
10 Education Financial Assistance Program, the Pedro “Doc” Sanchez Scholarship,  
11 John F. Quan Memorial Scholarship Program, the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita  
12 Teacher Corps, and the Every Child Entitled to a Higher Education Scholarship  
13 Program, for Fiscal Year 2022. The President of UOG shall allocate this  
14 appropriation to fund said student scholarships and financial assistance programs.  
15 No more than ten percent (10%) of the total appropriation in this Section shall be  
16 used for the administration of these programs. The President of UOG shall post on  
17 UOG’s website all reports mandated by this Act and existing law regarding the Dr.  
18 Antonio C. Yamashita Educator Corps, the student scholarships, and financial  
19 assistance programs.

20 (c) UOG may submit to *I Liheslatura* a proposed realignment plan or  
21 recommendations to amend statutory student scholarships and financial assistance  
22 programs consistent with community, workforce, and economic recovery needs.

23 (d) UOG may allocate from the General Fund appropriation in Section 2 of  
24 this Part of this Chapter any additional sums toward any other types of scholarships  
25 or financial assistance programs that it deems necessary, including, but not limited  
26 to, Regent Scholarships, the Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC), Marine Lab  
27 Graduate Assistance Programs, and Early High School Admission Programs.

1 (e) Nothing in this Section shall affect any multi-year scholarship awarded  
2 prior to enactment of this Act.

3 **Section 4. Appropriations for the Aquaculture Development and**  
4 **Training Center.** The sum of One Hundred Nine Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-one  
5 Dollars (**\$109,661**) is appropriated from the General Fund to UOG for Fiscal Year  
6 2022 for the purposes of funding the continued operations of the Aquaculture  
7 Development and Training Center, aquaculture-related activities, and the acquisition  
8 of additional real estate for expansion. Said funds shall not be transferred or used for  
9 any other purpose.

10 **Section 5. Appropriations for WERI's Guam Hydrologic Survey.** The  
11 sum of One Hundred Fifty-nine Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty-six Dollars  
12 (**\$159,956**) is appropriated from the General Fund to UOG for Fiscal Year 2022 for  
13 the sole purpose of funding the Guam Hydrologic Survey (GHS) administered by  
14 the Water and Environmental Research Institute of the Western Pacific (WERI).  
15 WERI shall continue to administer the GHS for those purposes previously  
16 established by Guam law. Such funds shall not be transferred or used for any other  
17 purpose.

18 In addition to the funds appropriated in this Section, Two Hundred Thirty-  
19 nine Thousand Three dollars (**\$239,003**) shall be allocated from the funds  
20 appropriated in Section 2(a) of this Part of this Chapter to UOG for Fiscal Year 2022  
21 for the sole purpose of funding the Guam Hydrologic Survey (GHS) administered  
22 by the Water and Environmental Research Institute of the Western Pacific (WERI).

23 **Section 6. Appropriations for WERI's Comprehensive Water Resource**  
24 **Monitoring Program.** The sum of One Hundred Thirty-six Thousand Two Hundred  
25 Sixty-two Dollars (**\$136,262**) is appropriated from the General Fund to UOG for  
26 Fiscal Year 2022 to fund WERI for Fiscal Year 2022.

1           Such funds identified in this Section shall be used for the sole purpose of  
2 matching the federal funding for the Comprehensive Water Resource Monitoring  
3 Program. WERI shall continue to administer the Comprehensive Water Resource  
4 Monitoring Program for those purposes previously established by Guam law. Such  
5 funds shall not be transferred or used for any other purpose.

6           In addition to the funds appropriated in this Section, Twenty-eight Thousand  
7 Four Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (**\$28,475**) shall be allocated from the funds  
8 appropriated in Section 2(a) of this Part of this Chapter to UOG for Fiscal Year 2022  
9 for the sole purpose of funding the Comprehensive Water Resource Monitoring  
10 Program administered by the Water and Environmental Research Institute of the  
11 Western Pacific (WERI).

12           **Section 7. Appropriations to the University of Guam for the Northern**  
13 **and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) Program.** The  
14 sum of One Hundred Thirty-three Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-six Dollars  
15 (**\$133,466**) is appropriated from the General Fund to UOG for the operations and  
16 activities of the Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts  
17 (SWCD) Program for Fiscal Year 2022 and shall be equally divided between the  
18 SWCDs. Such sums appropriated in this Section are authorized for use as the local  
19 matching requirement for Federal Grants-in-Aid.

20           The SWCD Board is authorized to use the services of another government of  
21 Guam agency to administer its accounting, procurement, payroll, and financial  
22 reporting requirements.

23           Expenditures from this appropriation shall be made upon the approval of the  
24 District Directors with the consent of the SWCD Board and shall not require further  
25 approval by UOG or any other government entity. Such funds shall not be transferred  
26 or used for any other purpose.

1           **Section 8. Appropriations to UOG for KPRG (Public Radio).** The sum  
2 of One Hundred Nine Thousand Four Hundred Forty-two Dollars (**\$109,442**) is  
3 appropriated from the General Fund to UOG for the Fiscal Year 2022 operations of  
4 KPRG. Such sums appropriated in this Section is authorized for use as a local  
5 matching requirement for Federal Grants-in-Aid.

6           No later than thirty (30) days after the close of each fiscal quarter, the General  
7 Manager of KPRG shall submit to the President of UOG and post on KPRG's  
8 website all reports mandated by this Act.

9           **Section 9. Appropriations to the Guampedia Foundation.** The sum of  
10 One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$150,000**) is appropriated from the General  
11 Fund to UOG for the Fiscal Year 2022 operations of the Guampedia Foundation.  
12 Such sums appropriated in this Section is authorized for use as a local matching  
13 requirement for Federal Grants-in-Aid.

14           **Section 10. UOG Capital Improvements Fund Continuing**  
15 **Appropriations.** The sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$500,000**) is  
16 appropriated from the Guam Educational Facilities Fund to the UOG Capital  
17 Improvements Fund for Fiscal Year 2022 for the purpose of paying for the debt  
18 service pursuant to § 16132, Chapter 16, Title 17 GCA.

19           **Section 11. Guam Cancer Trust Fund.** Notwithstanding § 26603(e)(1) of  
20 Article 6, Chapter 26, Title 11 GCA, the sum of Three Million Dollars (**\$3,000,000**)  
21 is appropriated from the Healthy Futures Fund to the Guam Cancer Trust Fund for  
22 the administration of the Guam Cancer Trust Fund for Fiscal Year 2022. The  
23 expenditures authorized in this Section shall be used to fund cancer screening,  
24 treatment, educational outreach programs, and support services. Any grant to  
25 organizations pursuant to § 26603(e)(2) of Article 6, Chapter 26, Title 11 GCA, shall  
26 only be used by such organizations for direct services to individuals for cancer  
27 screening, treatment, and support services. Notwithstanding any other provision of

1 law, no more than five percent (5%) of the funds authorized in this Section shall be  
2 expended for the purposes of administration of the Guam Cancer Trust Fund, to  
3 include accounting and reporting of the revenues and expenditures of the Fund. The  
4 President of UOG shall submit a monthly report of all expenditures of the Fund to  
5 the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

6 **Section 12. Guam Green Growth (G3) Initiative.** The sum of Five  
7 Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) is allocated from the General Fund  
8 appropriation in Section 2 of this Part of this Chapter to the University of Guam for  
9 Fiscal Year 2022 to fund the Research Corporation of the University of Guam  
10 (RCUOG) for the sole purpose of supporting the Guam Green Growth (G3) Initiative  
11 administered by the UOG Center for Island Sustainability. Aligned with the  
12 seventeen (17) United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, and with over  
13 ninety-nine (99) members from all sectors of society appointed by *Maga'hågan*  
14 *Guåhan* to its working group, G3 facilitates Guam's most comprehensive public-  
15 private partnership ever created to achieve a sustainable future. Through  
16 implementation of the G3 Action Framework, the G3 initiative cultivates an  
17 ecosystem for transformative action to achieve a more sustainable, prosperous, and  
18 equitable future for Guam. G3 activities support the emerging green economy and a  
19 green growth recovery. G3 places Guam at the global forefront of leadership in  
20 island sustainability, stimulates island circular economy industries, reduces the  
21 production of waste, reduces reliance on imports, promotes sustainable actions  
22 throughout the community, and conducts workforce development for the green  
23 economy. The expenditures authorized in this Section shall be used for G3 initiative  
24 operations, administration of the G3 Conservation Corps, supplies and equipment,  
25 membership in regional and global sustainability organizations, and to support  
26 educational and outreach activities. Said funds shall not be transferred or used for  
27 any other purpose. The sum appropriated herein is authorized for use as a local



1 matching requirement for Federal Grants-in-Aid and shall be prioritized for the local  
2 matching requirement of the National Science Foundation Guam Established  
3 Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR) Program and other grants.

4 The UOG Center for Island Sustainability shall prepare and submit to  
5 *Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft  
6 Excel file and written report, annual reports for the Guam Green Growth Initiative.  
7 At a minimum, said reports shall include: program mission statements, objectives,  
8 sources of revenue, expenditures by budget classification, number of employees, and  
9 contracts, and shall describe program accomplishments in the fiscal year reported.

10 **Section 13. Guam Cultural Repository.** The sum of One Million Six  
11 Hundred Seventy-five Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy-six Dollars (**\$1,675,876**)  
12 may be allocated from the General Fund appropriation in Section 2 of this Part of  
13 this Chapter to UOG for Fiscal Year 2022 to fund the Guam Cultural Repository  
14 Operations.

15 **Section 14. UOG Capital Improvements Fund.** The sum of One Million  
16 One Hundred Fifty-eight Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-three Dollars (**\$1,158,283**)  
17 shall be allocated from the General Fund appropriation in Section 2 of this Part of  
18 this Chapter to the UOG Capital Improvements Fund for the purpose of paying rental  
19 payments due under the lease-back agreement pursuant to Public Law 31-229:18, as  
20 repealed and reenacted by Public Law 31-277.

21 **Section 15. Program Revenue and Expenditure Reports.** No later than  
22 thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal quarter, the President of UOG shall post  
23 on the UOG website and submit to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I*  
24 *Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, quarterly program  
25 revenue and expenditure reports for the Aquaculture Development and Training  
26 Center, the WERI Guam Hydrologic Survey, the WERI Comprehensive Water  
27 Resource Monitoring Program, the Northern and Southern Soil and Water

1 Conservation Districts Programs, and KPRG. Said reports shall be in the format of  
2 basic financial statements or such format as may be prescribed by *I Liheslaturan*  
3 *Guåhan*.

4 **Section 16. Program Annual Reports.** The President of UOG shall post on  
5 UOG's website and shall submit to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I*  
6 *Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, annual reports for  
7 the Aquaculture Development and Training Center, the WERI Guam Hydrologic  
8 Survey, the WERI Comprehensive Water Resource Monitoring Program, the  
9 Northern and Southern Soil and Water Conservation Districts Programs, and KPRG.  
10 At a minimum, said reports shall include: program mission statements, objectives,  
11 sources of revenue, expenditures by budget classification, number of employees, and  
12 contracts; and shall describe program accomplishments in the fiscal year reported.

13 **Section 17. Scholarships, Financial Assistance, and Other Reports.** Sixty  
14 (60) days after the end of Fiscal Year 2022, the President of UOG shall submit to *I*  
15 *Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft  
16 Excel file and written report, and post on UOG's website, a report of expenditures  
17 from appropriations made in this Act for student scholarships, student financial  
18 assistance, and the Dr. Antonio C. Yamashita Educator Corps. Said report shall  
19 include each program's name, the number of scholarships or loans issued by each  
20 program, the names of the recipients awarded by each program, the university or  
21 college each award recipient is attending by each program, the date the scholarship  
22 or loan was awarded by each program, the anticipated date of cohort graduation by  
23 each program, the total amount of awards or loans, the total amount of loans repaid  
24 to date by each program, the balance of the outstanding awards or loans by each  
25 program, the amount of collections to date for outstanding loans and repayments due  
26 by each program, the number of awards for each field of study by each program, and

1 the number of recipients working to complete their academic and financial  
2 obligations by each program.

3 **Section 18. Transfer Authority for the UOG.** Appropriations for the  
4 operations of UOG contained in Section 2 of this Part of this Chapter may be  
5 transferred by the President of UOG out of operations and into the appropriation for  
6 statutorily mandated scholarship programs, exclusive of administrative costs,  
7 contained in Section 3 of this Part of this Chapter.

8 **Section 19. Reporting Requirements.** UOG shall submit a drawdown  
9 schedule to the Director of Administration pursuant to § 1303.1 of Article 3, Chapter  
10 1, Title 5 GCA, no later than October 31, 2021. Within ten (10) days after the end of  
11 every quarter, the President of UOG shall submit to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan*  
12 *Guåhan* a written report detailing the amount of cash received by UOG from the  
13 Department of Administration for the preceding quarter, compared to the quarterly  
14 drawdown schedule submitted pursuant to § 1303.1 of Article 3, Chapter 1, Title 5  
15 GCA, for Fiscal Year 2022, detailed by fund.

16 **Section 20. Exemption from BBMR Allotment Release Control and**  
17 **Appropriation Reserves.** Pursuant to § 1303.1 of Article 3, Chapter 1, Title 5 GCA,  
18 the management of allotments by the Bureau of Budget and Management Research  
19 (BBMR) shall not apply to UOG. BBMR shall release the allotments based on the  
20 UOG submission of the FY 2022 allotment schedule and shall not be authorized to  
21 hold any appropriation reserves on any funds appropriated to UOG. The Department  
22 of Administration shall provide cash disbursements to UOG for all the General Fund  
23 and Special Fund appropriations made to UOG in this Act.

24 **Section 21. Sea Grant Program.** The sum of Five Hundred Thousand  
25 Dollars (\$500,000) is allocated from the General Fund appropriation in Section 2 of  
26 this Part of this Chapter to the University of Guam Sea Grant Special Fund  
27 (established by Public Law 35-114) for Fiscal Year 2022 to fund the Sea Grant

1 Program for the sole purpose of supporting the Sea Grant program administered by  
2 the University of Guam Center for Island Sustainability. UOG has been a Land Grant  
3 institution since 1972, and the status has brought significant opportunities for UOG,  
4 Guam, and the region in agriculture, terrestrial resources management, and  
5 development of the community. Having received a formal notice to review from the  
6 National Sea Grant Director, UOG now has a once-in-a-generation opportunity to  
7 achieve “Sea Grant Status” and bring similar opportunities to Guam and the region  
8 in marine resource management, environmental stewardship, and the community  
9 development of coastal communities. The National Sea Grant College Program is a  
10 partnership between universities and the federal government’s National Oceanic and  
11 Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), an agency within the U.S. Department of  
12 Commerce. The UOG Sea Grant applies research, extension, and educational  
13 activities that sustain and develop island environments while integrating the  
14 knowledge and culture of island people. The UOG Sea Grant provides local  
15 workforce development training in marine and environmental sciences through  
16 research funding, internships, fellowships and grants; funds research competitions  
17 among faculty, colleges, and nonprofit organizations to promote understanding and  
18 better management of coastal resources in Guam and Micronesia; and, perpetuates  
19 traditional local knowledge in navigation and fisheries through teaching, research,  
20 outreach, and apprenticeships. The expenditures authorized in this Section shall be  
21 used for UOG Sea Grant operations and administrative costs, hiring of faculty and  
22 administrative staff, facility improvement, and supplies and equipment. The sum  
23 appropriated herein is authorized for use as a local matching requirement for Grants-  
24 in-Aid and shall be prioritized for use as the local matching requirement to achieve  
25 and maintain Sea Grant Institutional Status, which has the potential to garner a 1:2  
26 federal contribution of up to One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in federal funds to  
27 UOG per year.

1           The President of the University of Guam shall post on UOG's website and  
2 shall submit to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in  
3 a Microsoft Excel file and written report, annual reports for the UOG Sea Grant  
4 Special Fund. At a minimum, said reports shall include: program mission statements,  
5 objectives, sources of revenue, expenditures by budget classification, number of  
6 employees, and contracts, and shall describe program accomplishments in the fiscal  
7 year reported.

1 **CHAPTER II**

2 **EDUCATION**

3 **PART IV – GUAM COMMUNITY COLLEGE**

4 **Section 1. Legislative Intent.** It is the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to  
5 provide a lump sum appropriation to the Guam Community College (GCC). The  
6 funds shall be expended in accordance with the budget request submitted and the  
7 priorities stipulated by the GCC Board of Trustees.

8 It is also the intent of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* that external funds available to  
9 agencies and departments shall be taken into consideration to determine the current  
10 appropriation level needed. *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* further intends to maximize  
11 services and programs of the agencies through pursuit of indirect cost  
12 reimbursements to reduce the local funding where applicable.

13 **Section 2. Appropriation.** The amounts in the Subsections below are  
14 appropriated from the following Funds and for the following purposes to GCC for  
15 Fiscal Year 2022:

16 (a) General Fund Appropriations for Operations, GCC Licensed Practical  
17 Nursing and Vocational Guidance Programs, and GCC Lodging Management  
18 Program/ProStart Program. The sum of Fifteen Million Eight Hundred Twenty-five  
19 Thousand Six Hundred Thirty-one Dollars (**\$15,825,631**) is appropriated from the  
20 General Fund to GCC for its operations in Fiscal Year 2022, and to support the  
21 operations of the GCC Licensed Practical Nursing Program and the Vocational  
22 Guidance Program, and the GCC Lodging Management Program/ProStart Program  
23 for Fiscal Year 2022.

24 (b) Appropriations to the GCC Apprenticeship Program. The sum of Three  
25 Million Nine Hundred Twenty-four Thousand Four Hundred Eighty Dollars  
26 (**\$3,924,480**) is appropriated from the Manpower Development Fund to GCC for the  
27 GCC Apprenticeship Program for Fiscal Year 2022. In addition to the authorization

1 contained in § 7120, Chapter 7, Title 22 GCA, the appropriation in this Subsection  
2 (b) shall be available and authorized to be used by GCC to fund the operations of  
3 other programs at GCC, as approved by its Board and Administration, after all the  
4 Apprenticeship Program requirements and obligations have been fully funded.

5 (c) Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid. The sum of Five Hundred Twenty-  
6 three Thousand One Hundred Twenty-six Dollars (\$523,126) is authorized from  
7 Federal Matching Grants-in-Aid to GCC for its operations in Fiscal Year 2022.

8 **Section 3. GCC Capital Improvements Fund Appropriations.** The sum  
9 of Two Hundred Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$200,400) is appropriated from  
10 the Guam Educational Facilities Fund to the GCC Capital Improvements Fund in  
11 Fiscal Year 2022 for the purpose of paying rental payments due under the lease-back  
12 agreement pursuant to Section 22 of Public Law 31-229.

13 **Section 4. Reports.** The President of GCC shall submit quarterly reports to  
14 *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft  
15 Excel file and written report, thirty (30) days after the end of each fiscal quarter, and  
16 post said report on the GCC website. Said reports shall include, but are not limited  
17 to, the number of participants in each GCC program, the amounts expended from  
18 appropriations in this Act by object classification, a description of each program, the  
19 academic courses offered, and the requirements for participation in each program.

20 **Section 5. Reporting Requirements.** GCC shall submit a drawdown  
21 schedule to the Director of Administration pursuant to § 1303.1 of Article 3, Chapter  
22 1, Title 5 GCA, no later than October 31, 2021. Within ten (10) days after the end of  
23 every quarter, the President of GCC shall submit to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan*  
24 *Guåhan* a written report detailing the amount of cash received by GCC from the  
25 Department of Administration for the preceding quarter, compared to the quarterly  
26 drawdown schedule submitted pursuant to § 1303.1 of Article 3, Chapter 1, Title 5  
27 GCA, for Fiscal Year 2022, detailed by fund.

1           **Section 6. First Generation Trust Fund Initiative.** Pursuant to Public  
2 Law 33-07, Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$200,000**) is appropriated from the  
3 General Fund to GCC for the First Generation Trust Fund Initiative.

4           **Section 7. Peace Officer Standards and Training Commission.** The sum  
5 of up to Seventy-two Thousand One Hundred Twenty-one Dollars (**\$72,121**) may  
6 be allocated from the General Fund appropriation in Section 2(a) of this Part of this  
7 Chapter to GCC for Fiscal Year 2022 for the purpose of funding a Program Specialist  
8 to establish a Standardized and Uniformed Law Enforcement Officer General Force  
9 Leadership Structure Tier and General Pay Scale Plan for Category 1 Peace Officers.

4 **Section 1. Appropriation.** The sum of Two Hundred Twenty-eight

7 Certification (GCEC) for its operations in Fiscal Year 2022 to provide administrative

9 Post-Secondary Institution Certification pursuant to § 44104(e), Chapter 44, Title 17  
10 GCA.

7 Fiscal Year 2022. This sum is composed of Thirty-five Million Three Hundred Four  
8 Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety-three Dollars (**\$35,304,893**) from the General  
9 Fund, and Fifteen Million Two Hundred Thirty-seven Thousand Six Hundred

2           (a)    The sum of Eleven Million Forty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Three  
3 Dollars (**\$11,047,503**) shall be allocated from the General Fund and Two Million  
4 Six Hundred Thirty Thousand One Hundred Dollars (**\$2,630,100**) shall be allocated  
5 from the Healthy Futures Fund appropriation in Section 1 of this Part of this Chapter

16 amounts authorized hereby, exceeds Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000).  
17 No persons eligible for Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits shall  
18 receive more than the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) in  
19 combined retirement annuities and supplemental retirement annuities.

20           (C) Any retiree or survivor eligible to receive the  
21 supplemental annuity may waive their supplemental annuity payment  
22 authorized herein by the filing of a notarized affidavit waiving such  
23 payment with the Retirement Fund.”

24           **Section 3. Disability Supplemental Annuity Additions.** § 8129(g) of  
25 Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to read:

26           “(g) Any disability retirement annuitant who commenced receiving a  
27 disability retirement annuity prior to October 1, 1995, and who is entitled to

1 disability retirement benefits under this Chapter shall receive, during the  
2 period commencing on October 1, 2021 and ending on September 30, 2022,  
3 for Fiscal Year 2022, prospective non-cumulative supplemental annuity  
4 benefits as follows:

5 (1) Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars  
6 (\$4,238) in Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, known as the sum  
7 of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five  
8 Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight  
9 Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$838) in annual benefits formerly  
10 contained in various General Appropriation Acts.

11 (2) (A) No persons eligible for Retiree Supplemental  
12 Annuity Benefits provided for in this Subsection shall receive such  
13 benefit if their regular annual retirement annuity, excluding survivor  
14 benefits, prior to the supplemental amounts herein, exceeds Forty  
15 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000).

16 (B) No persons eligible for Retiree Supplemental  
17 Annuity Benefits shall receive more than the sum of Forty  
18 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) in combined retirement annuities  
19 and supplemental retirement annuities.

20 (3) Any disability retirement annuitant eligible to receive the  
21 supplemental annuity may waive their supplemental annuity payment  
22 authorized herein by the filing of a notarized affidavit waiving such  
23 payment with the Retirement Fund.”

24 **Section 4. Retirees Supplemental Annuity Additions.** § 8122(d)(6) of  
25 Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read as  
26 follows:

1           “(6) Any retirement annuitant who commenced receiving a retirement  
2 annuity prior to October 1, 1995, and who is entitled to retirement benefits  
3 under this Chapter, shall receive, during the period commencing on October  
4 1, 2021 and ending on September 30, 2022, for Fiscal Year 2022, prospective,  
5 non-cumulative supplemental annuity benefits as follows:

6           (A) Four Thousand Two Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars  
7 (\$4,238) in Retiree Supplemental Annuity Benefits, known as the sum  
8 of One Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,200), One Thousand Five  
9 Hundred Dollars (\$1,500), Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700), and Eight  
10 Hundred Thirty-eight Dollars (\$838) in annual benefits formerly  
11 contained in various General Appropriation Acts.

12           (B) No retiree who is eligible for Retiree Supplemental  
13 Annuity Benefits provided for in this Subsection shall receive such  
14 benefit if her/his regular annual retirement annuity, excluding the  
15 supplemental amounts authorized herein and survivor benefits, exceeds  
16 Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000). A retiree who is eligible for Retiree  
17 Supplemental Annuity Benefits shall receive no more than Forty  
18 Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) in combined retirement annuities and  
19 supplemental retirement annuities.

20           (C) Any retiree or survivor eligible to receive the  
21 supplemental annuity may waive the supplemental annuity payment  
22 authorized herein by the filing of a notarized affidavit waiving such  
23 payment with the Retirement Fund.”

24           **Section 5. Appropriation for Cost of Living Allowance (COLA).**

25           (a) *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* shall provide by a single lump sum payment, a  
26 Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to each  
27 retiree of the Government of Guam Retirement Fund (GGRF) who is retired as of

1 September 30, 2021, or his/her survivor, no later than November 1, 2021. If a retiree  
2 is a Defined Benefit and a Defined Contribution retiree, the retiree or his/her survivor  
3 shall only be entitled to a single COLA payment. The sum of Fourteen Million Six  
4 Hundred Forty-six Thousand Dollars (**\$14,646,000**) is appropriated from the  
5 General Fund to the Department of Administration for Fiscal Year 2022, to pay said  
6 COLA.

7 (b) The Guam Power Authority, the A.B. Won Pat International Airport  
8 Authority, the Guam Economic Development Authority, the Guam Housing  
9 Corporation, the Government of Guam Retirement Fund, the Jose D. Leon Guerrero  
10 Commercial Port, the Guam Waterworks Authority, and the Guam Visitors Bureau  
11 shall pay a COLA in a single payment of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to every  
12 Government of Guam Retirement Fund retiree who retired from each respective  
13 aforementioned agency as of September 30, 2021, or his/her survivor, no later than  
14 November 1, 2021 for Fiscal Year 2022.

15 (c) Each agency mentioned in Subsection (b) of this Section shall  
16 reimburse the General Fund for any COLA paid by the General Fund in Fiscal Year  
17 2022 to retirees who have retired from that agency and their survivors no later than  
18 December 31, 2021.

19 (d) Any retiree or survivor eligible to receive the COLA may waive their  
20 payment authorized herein by filing a notarized affidavit waiving such payment with  
21 the entity responsible for the Retirement Fund.

22 (e) If a retiree is both a Defined Benefit and a Defined Contribution  
23 Retiree, her or his survivor shall only be entitled to a single COLA payment.

24 **Section 6. Retiree Medical, Dental, and Life Insurance Expenses**  
25 **Appropriated to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund.** For Fiscal Year  
26 2022, the sum of Thirty-two Million Eight Hundred Ninety-one Thousand Seven

1 Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (**\$32,891,775**) is appropriated from the General Fund  
2 to pay the following items for current retirees:

3 (a) Retiree group medical, dental, and life insurance premiums,  
4 including premiums and coverage for Judiciary of Guam retirees, to continue  
5 existing programs currently contained in the semi-monthly payments.

6 (b) Retiree life insurance subsidy, including subsidy for Judiciary of  
7 Guam retirees, to continue existing programs currently contained in the semi-  
8 monthly payments.

9 **Section 7. Pacific Islands Development Bank.** *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* is  
10 hereby authorized to deposit such funds necessary into the Pacific Islands  
11 Development Bank as authorized under Public Law 22-148.

12 **Section 8. Department of Agriculture Civilian Volunteer Conservation**  
13 **Officers Program.** The sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (**\$200,000**) is  
14 appropriated from the General Fund, specifically the business privilege tax savings  
15 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 as a result of savings achieved from  
16 the release of set aside obligations from the funding of certain existing Government  
17 of Guam Business Privilege Tax Bonds, to the Department of Agriculture to fund  
18 the needs of the Civilian Volunteer Conservation Officers Program, including  
19 procurement of critical equipment and supplies.

20 **Section 9. GAIN Spay and Neuter Program.** The sum of Four Hundred  
21 Fifty Thousand Dollars (**\$450,000**) is appropriated from the General Fund,  
22 specifically the business privilege tax savings for the fiscal year ending September  
23 30, 2021 as a result of savings achieved from the release of set aside obligations  
24 from the funding of certain existing Government of Guam Business Privilege Tax  
25 Bonds, to the Department of Agriculture to fund the GAIN Spay and Neuter  
26 Program.

1           **Section 10. CAHA Gallery.** The sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000)  
2 is appropriated from the General Fund, specifically the business privilege tax savings  
3 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 as a result of savings achieved from  
4 the release of set aside obligations from the funding of certain existing Government  
5 of Guam Business Privilege Tax Bonds, to the Guam Council on the Arts and  
6 Humanities Agency (CAHA) to fund equipment and ancillary supplies and materials  
7 for its new gallery.

8           **Section 11. Appropriation for the Government of Guam Retirement**  
9 **Fund Study.** The sum of Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) is appropriated  
10 from the General Fund, specifically the Business Privilege Tax savings for the Fiscal  
11 Year ending September 30, 2021 as a result of savings achieved from the release of  
12 set aside obligations from the funding of certain existing Government of Guam  
13 Business Privilege Tax Bonds, to the Government of Guam Retirement Fund for the  
14 purpose of conducting a study to commence within the fiscal year that will inform  
15 further policy to include, but not be limited to the following:

16           (a) Providing uniformed personnel as defined in § 8104(p), Article 1,  
17 Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated with varying options to include  
18 requiring additional employee contributions, cost of additional government  
19 contribution, or a combination of both that may allow for retirement ages without  
20 reduction of retirement annuity after attaining at least fifty-five (55) years of age and  
21 completing twenty-five (25) years of service under § 8503(c), Article 5, Chapter 8,  
22 Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated.

23           (b) An analysis of costs associated with providing the option for uniformed  
24 personnel and other government of Guam classified employees who did not have the  
25 option for membership in the Defined Benefit 1.75 Retirement System pursuant to §  
26 8502, Article 5, Chapter 8, Title 4 of the Guam Code Annotated to enter the Defined  
27 Benefit 1.75 Retirement System.



1           **Section 12. Guam Fisherman’s Co-op.** The sum of One Hundred Thousand  
2 Dollars (**\$100,000**) is appropriated from the General Fund, specifically the business  
3 privilege tax savings for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 as a result of  
4 savings achieved from the release of set aside obligations from the funding of certain  
5 existing Government of Guam Business Privilege Tax Bonds, to the Department of  
6 Administration to fund part of the reconstruction and renovation of the Guam  
7 Fisherman’s Co-op facility. The operational costs for the transition from the current  
8 facility to a temporary facility is authorized.

9           **Section 13. Additional Appropriation for the Northern Soil and Water**  
10 **Conservation District and Southern Soil and Water Conservation District.** The  
11 sum of Sixty-seven Thousand Dollars (**\$67,000**) is appropriated from the General  
12 Fund to the Northern Soil and Water Conservation District and Southern Soil and  
13 Water Conservation District.

14           **Section 14. Department of Revenue and Taxation.** The sum of Five  
15 Hundred Ninety-seven Thousand Three Hundred Twenty-six Dollars (**\$597,326**) is  
16 appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Revenue and Taxation.

17           **Section 15. Department of Agriculture Continuing Appropriation.**  
18 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the allotted but unexpended balance of  
19 funds appropriated to the Department of Agriculture for Fiscal Year 2021 shall not  
20 lapse and shall continue to be available until fully expended.

21           **Section 16. Bureau of Statistics and Plans Continuing Appropriation.**  
22 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the unexpended balance of funds  
23 appropriated to the Bureau of Statistics and Plans in Public Law 35-99 shall not lapse  
24 and shall continue to be available until fully expended.

25           **Section 17. Department of Labor Continuing Appropriation.**  
26 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the unexpended balance of funds

1 appropriated to the Department of Labor in Public Law 35-99 shall not lapse and  
2 shall continue to be available until fully expended.

3 **Section 18. Educator Classification, Compensation & Benefit Study.** The  
4 sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) shall be allocated from the  
5 General Fund appropriation in Section 1 of Part I of Chapter II for the sole purpose  
6 of funding an Educator Classification, Compensation & Benefit Study to adjust  
7 classified and unclassified educator compensation and classification in Fiscal Year  
8 2022, to be submitted to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*. The final, implementable plan to  
9 adjust compensation, classification, and benefits shall be submitted by *I Maga'hågan*  
10 *Guåhan* to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than September 30, 2022.  
11 The implementation of salary increases due from said plan shall be effective on June  
12 30, 2023 after receipt of the plan by the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* unless  
13 disapproved or amended.

14 **Section 19. DPHSS Division of Senior Citizens.** The sum of Four Hundred  
15 Ten Thousand Dollars (\$410,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the  
16 Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS) for the operations of the  
17 DPHSS Division of Senior Citizens, including personnel services, for Fiscal Year  
18 2022.

19 **Section 20. Continuing Appropriation Authorization.** Notwithstanding  
20 any other provision of law, the unexpended balance of funds appropriated in  
21 Subsections (d), (g), (u), (aa) and (cc) of Section 1, Chapter V, Chapter VI; and  
22 Chapter X of Public Law 35-99 for Fiscal Year 2021 and prior shall not lapse and  
23 shall continue to be available until fully expended.



1 The retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the  
2 incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired corrections officers may  
3 be hired only in the ranks of Corrections Officers Supervisor I and below, only at  
4 Step I, and shall not receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this Section  
5 shall meet the requirements for the position in question except for written  
6 examinations. The Director of DOC shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for  
7 duty. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired  
8 temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits.  
9 Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the  
10 Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The DOC  
11 Director shall submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022, and again  
12 thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired officers hired  
13 pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of  
14 said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

15 **Section 4. Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Police Officers.**

16 The Guam Police Department (GPD) may hire retired Guam police officers if a  
17 critical need arises because of military activation of GPD police officers or absence  
18 due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor.  
19 The GPD may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for  
20 personnel is not exceeded. The retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall  
21 be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired  
22 officers may be hired only at the ranks of Sergeant I and below, only at Step I, and  
23 shall not receive sick and annual leave. Officers hired under this Section shall first  
24 meet the requirements for the position in question, except for written examinations,  
25 and the Chief of Police of GPD shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty.  
26 Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired  
27 temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. The

1 GPD may pay Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve stipends to a Police Reserve  
2 Officer to provide temporary services of a regular police officer. Any employee  
3 hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam  
4 Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The Chief of Police shall submit  
5 a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022, and again thirty (30) days after  
6 the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired officers hired pursuant to this  
7 Section, the positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and  
8 the nature of the critical need that was filled.

9 **Section 5. Temporary Employment of Retired Guam Firefighters.** The  
10 Guam Fire Department (GFD) may hire retired GFD firefighters if a critical need  
11 arises because of military activation of GFD firefighters or absence due to a long-  
12 term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor. The GFD may  
13 exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not  
14 exceeded. The retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated  
15 when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retired firefighters  
16 may be hired only at the ranks of Fire Specialist and below, only at Step I, and shall  
17 not receive sick and annual leave. Retired firefighters hired under this Section shall  
18 meet the requirements for the position in question, except for written examinations,  
19 and the Fire Chief of GFD shall certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty.  
20 Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired  
21 temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits.  
22 Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the  
23 Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The Fire  
24 Chief of GFD shall submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022, and  
25 again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired  
26 firefighters hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of  
27 employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

1           **Section 6. Temporary Employment of Retired Customs and**  
2 **Quarantine Officers.** The Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA) may hire retired  
3 customs and quarantine officers if a critical need arises because of military activation  
4 of CQA customs officers or absence due to a long-term disability status which has  
5 been certified by a medical doctor, or when vacancies cannot be filled within six (6)  
6 months because of the lack of qualified applicants. The CQA may exercise this  
7 hiring authority provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The  
8 retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the  
9 incumbent returns from military service or absence or when a fully-qualified  
10 applicant is available. Retired officers may be hired only in the ranks of Customs  
11 Officer III and below, only at Step I, and shall not receive sick and annual leave.  
12 Retirees hired pursuant to this Section shall meet the requirements for the position  
13 in question, except for written examinations, and the Director of the CQA shall  
14 certify that every retiree hired is fit for duty. The requirements of Chapter 51 of Title  
15 17 GCA are waived for employment pursuant hereto, except for § 51104(b)(4).  
16 Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired  
17 temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits.  
18 Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the  
19 Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The  
20 Director of CQA shall submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022,  
21 and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired  
22 officers hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of employment,  
23 the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

24           **Section 7. Temporary Employment of Retired Department of Revenue**  
25 **and Taxation Employees.** The Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) may  
26 hire retired Guam DRT employees when a critical need arises. Examples of a critical  
27 need may include temporary staff shortages due to challenges with recruitment due

1 to a limited pool of qualified individuals, military activation of DRT employees, or  
2 absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical  
3 doctor, and instances where additional programs or mandates are required to be  
4 executed. The DRT may exercise this hiring authority in the following divisions:  
5 Taxpayer Services Division, Tax Enforcement Division, Real Property Tax  
6 Division, Director's Office (Executive Direction), Regulatory Division, and Motor  
7 Vehicle Division, provided its authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. The  
8 retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated when the  
9 incumbent returns from military service or absence, when there is successful  
10 recruitment for the position, or within a reasonable time after the additional program  
11 or mandate for which the employee was hired is completed. Said retirees shall be  
12 hired at a minimum of Step I for the position in question and shall not receive sick  
13 and annual leave benefits. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title  
14 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive  
15 retirement benefits. Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to  
16 enroll in the Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee.  
17 The DRT Director shall submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022,  
18 and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired  
19 employees hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of  
20 employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

21 **Section 8. Temporary Employment of Retired Government of Guam**  
22 **Social Workers.** The Department of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS)  
23 may hire retired Guam social workers if a critical need arises. DPHSS may exercise  
24 this hiring authority for social workers in Child Protective Services provided its  
25 authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded. Said retirees shall be hired at a  
26 minimum of Step I for the position in question and shall not receive sick and annual  
27 leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired

1 temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits.  
2 Any employee hired under this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the  
3 Government of Guam Health Insurance Program as an active employee. The  
4 Director of DPHSS shall submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022,  
5 and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the number of retired  
6 employees hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the length of  
7 employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that was filled.

8 **Section 9. Temporary Employment of Retired GDOE Teachers.** The  
9 Guam Department of Education (GDOE) may hire retired GDOE teachers who are  
10 not eligible for Medicare Parts A and B, and who shall remain covered under the  
11 Government of Guam Group Health Insurance Program as a retired person, if a  
12 critical need arises as a result of military activation of GDOE teachers or absence  
13 due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a medical doctor.  
14 The GDOE may exercise this hiring authority provided its authorized budget for  
15 personnel is not exceeded. The retiree hired shall fill such a vacant position and shall  
16 be terminated when the incumbent returns from military service or absence. Retirees  
17 shall be hired at a minimum of Step I for the position in question and shall not receive  
18 sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4  
19 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to this Section may continue to receive  
20 retirement benefits. The Superintendent of GDOE shall submit a report to *I*  
21 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* on July 1, 2022, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the  
22 fiscal year, of the number of retired employees hired pursuant to this Section, the  
23 positions filled, the length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of  
24 the critical need that was filled.

25 **Section 10. Temporary Employment of Retired Attorneys.** The Attorney  
26 General of Guam, the Unified Judiciary, the Public Defender Service Corporation,  
27 and the Alternate Public Defender may hire retired government of Guam attorneys



1 on a full or part-time basis when a critical need arises. These entities may exercise  
2 this hiring authority for attorneys, provided that the authorized budget for personnel  
3 for the entity is not exceeded. Said attorneys shall be hired up to Step 5 of the  
4 Attorney 4 pay scale and shall not receive sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding §  
5 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title 4 GCA, retirees hired temporarily pursuant to  
6 this Section may continue to receive retirement benefits. Any attorney hired under  
7 this Section shall only be eligible to enroll in the Government of Guam Health  
8 Insurance Program as an active employee. Such employment shall not close  
9 vacancies to qualified applicants. Each entity shall report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*  
10 on July 1, 2022, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the fiscal year, of the  
11 number of retired attorneys hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the  
12 length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that  
13 was filled.

14 **Section 11. Temporary Employment of Retired Department of Public**  
15 **Works Employees.**

16 (a) The Department of Public Works (DPW) may hire retired Guam DPW  
17 employees when a critical need arises because of *I Maga'hågan Guåhan's*  
18 declaration of a state of public health emergency to respond to the novel coronavirus  
19 (COVID-19) pandemic on Guam.

20 (1) Identified Areas. The DPW may exercise this hiring authority in  
21 the areas of engineering and construction, building permits and inspection,  
22 construction quality control, design and analysis, project coordination and  
23 quality control, highway planning, highway programming, coordination and  
24 control, highway maintenance and construction, and building construction  
25 and facilities maintenance.

26 (2) Special Rules for Hiring of Retired Employees. Any retiree hired  
27 pursuant to this Section shall fill such a vacant position and shall be terminated

1 upon the lifting of the declaration of a state of public health emergency. Such  
2 retirees shall be hired at Step I for the position in question and shall not receive  
3 sick and annual leave. Notwithstanding § 8121(a) of Article 1, Chapter 8, Title  
4 4 GCA, retirees hired pursuant to this Section may continue to receive  
5 retirement benefits.

6 (b) The DPW Director shall submit a report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* on  
7 July 1, 2022, and again thirty (30) days after the end of the current fiscal year, of the  
8 number of retired employees hired pursuant to this Section, the positions filled, the  
9 length of employment, the cost of said hiring, and the nature of the critical need that  
10 was filled.

11 **Section 12. Temporary Employment or Detail, Absence Due to Military**  
12 **Service or Long-Term Disability.** Notwithstanding the provisions of § 4117 of  
13 Article 1, Chapter 4, Title 4 GCA, in the event a classified employee will be absent  
14 from work in excess of thirty (30) consecutive work days due to active military  
15 service or a long-term disability certified in writing by a medical doctor, the  
16 appointing authority for an agency may temporarily assign or detail another  
17 employee to assume the responsibilities of the absent employee. Such detail or  
18 assignment may be in effect for up to the same number of days of the consecutive  
19 absence due to active military service or medical disability. The appointing authority  
20 may also fill such vacancies by limited term appointment, and any such appointment  
21 may be in effect for up to the same number of days of the consecutive absence due  
22 to active military service or medical disability.

23 **Section 13. Locum Tenens Exemption During the Absence of the Chief**  
24 **Medical Examiner.** The Office of Post-Mortem Examinations is exempt from the  
25 government of Guam procurement law in contracting for the professional services  
26 of a qualified medical examiner to be provided when the Chief Medical Examiner is  
27 absent from work.

1           **Section 14. Advance Payments for Medical Services.** In order to expedite  
2 acceptance of Medically Indigent Program (MIP) clients by facilities in California,  
3 Hawaii, or Manila for medical treatment approved by the MIP, the Director of Public  
4 Health and Social Services may advance payments for said medical treatment and  
5 may establish escrow accounts for immediate and advance payment of medical  
6 treatment at those Joint Commission Accredited hospitals determined by the  
7 Director to be best able to service Medically Indigent Program clients.

8           **Section 15. Transfer of Employees.**

9           (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law and in recognition of  
10 personnel shortages in certain areas, *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* is authorized to transfer  
11 employees during Fiscal Year 2022 within or between any line department or agency  
12 of the government of Guam, except that:

13                   (1) this Section shall not apply to any employee of the Legislative or  
14 Judicial Branches, or any employee within the Mayors Council of Guam and  
15 village Mayors' offices;

16                   (2) the transfer of an employee shall not result in a loss of pay or  
17 salary;

18                   (3) no employee shall be transferred if the employee has filed a  
19 viable grievance with the Civil Service Commission for discrimination based  
20 on political affiliation, gender, or sexual harassment, unless the employee  
21 consents to such transfer;

22                   (4) notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation,  
23 no employee of an autonomous agency may be transferred to a line department  
24 or agency;

25                   (5) *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* shall transfer the funding authorized for  
26 that employee's position from the transferor agency to the transferee agency,

1 including GMHA, DPHSS, and GBHWC, unless the transfer is from a line  
2 agency to an autonomous agency;

3 (6) this Section shall not be used to transfer employees acting in  
4 good faith who report or expose bad business practices, illegal activities, or  
5 inappropriate conduct by public officials;

6 (7) no employee who has filed a whistleblower complaint as  
7 provided for in statute shall be transferred unless the employee consents to  
8 such transfer.

9 (b) *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* shall submit a report to the Speaker of *I*  
10 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* of the transfer of each employee pursuant to this authorization  
11 with the name and position of the employee being transferred, the line department  
12 or agency the employee is being transferred from, the line department or agency the  
13 employee is being transferred to, the time duration of the transfer, and whether the  
14 transfer is permanent, by the twentieth (20th) day after each month of the fiscal year.

15 **Section 16. Competitive Wage Act Employee Appeals Pay.** Pursuant to the  
16 authority under § 6218.1 of Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated,  
17 relative to allowing retroactive pay adjustments, all executive branch departments  
18 and agencies are hereby authorized to utilize their entity's operational budgets to  
19 make retroactive pay adjustments for employees whose appeals were adjudicated  
20 and affirmed by the Competitive Wage Act appeals process conducted by the  
21 Department of Administration; provided, that it does not negatively impact current  
22 operational needs. This authorization shall be applied retroactively to January 26,  
23 2014 for affected employees.

24 **Section 17. Board and Commission Stipends.**

25 (a) Any compensation or stipend owed to a board or commission member  
26 for attending a regular or special meeting in Fiscal Year 2022 shall be paid from  
27 appropriations in this Act by the department or agency responsible for the

1 administrative support and operations of such board or commission. Board and  
2 commission members may elect to not receive said compensation. *I Maga'hågan*  
3 *Guåhan* may, by Executive Order, waive the payment of meeting stipends owed to  
4 any board or commission member.

5 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, each member of the Guam Parole  
6 Board shall be compensated Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) for every meeting  
7 the member attends. No member shall be compensated more than One Thousand  
8 Dollars (\$1,000) per month, irrespective of the number of meetings that a member  
9 attends in any given month.

10 **Section 18. Contracts.** Positions in the classified and unclassified service of  
11 the government of Guam shall not be filled pursuant to a contractual arrangement,  
12 except as provided in this Section, for Fiscal Year 2022.

13 (a) Subject to Chapter 5 of Title 5 GCA, government of Guam  
14 departments and agencies may contract with independent contractors;  
15 provided, that no agency may contract for services customarily provided by  
16 employees in the classified service, except as provided by law.

17 (b) Government of Guam departments and agencies that do not  
18 customarily obtain professional services, such as licensed health  
19 professionals, licensed architects, licensed engineers, legal services, actuarial  
20 services, and auditing services through an employee in the classified service  
21 in that department or agency may contract to obtain such services.

22 (c) The Office of the Attorney General, the Public Defender Service  
23 Corporation, and the Alternate Public Defender are authorized to contract with  
24 attorneys as independent contractors to provide services in areas in which it is  
25 impracticable or impossible for the office to proceed. Such contracts shall be  
26 in accordance with the procurement laws of Guam. No such independent  
27 contractor hired pursuant to this Section may receive from the government of

1 Guam any remuneration in any form other than in payment for the position  
2 into which such person is hired. The Office of the Attorney General, the  
3 Executive Director of the Public Defender Service Corporation, and the  
4 Executive Director of the Alternate Public Defender shall file a copy of every  
5 such contract with the Chief Procurement Officer and the Director of  
6 Administration together with a written certification stating why it is  
7 impracticable to handle the matter within the office as otherwise constituted.

8 (d) This Section shall not apply to the Guam Department of  
9 Education; the University of Guam; the Guam Community College; the  
10 Unified Judiciary when filling positions of justices and judges pro tem, law  
11 clerks, and legal interns; the Department of Revenue and Taxation when  
12 filling the position of legal counsel; *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; the Guam  
13 Memorial Hospital Authority; and the Department of Public Health and Social  
14 Services and the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center when filling  
15 positions of licensed health professionals.

16 (e) Any instrumentality of the government of Guam that fills any  
17 classified or unclassified positions by contractual arrangement in accordance  
18 with this Section shall file a copy of every such contract with the Chief  
19 Procurement Officer and the Director of Administration together with a  
20 written certification stating why it is impracticable to handle the matter within  
21 the instrumentality as otherwise constituted.

22 **Section 19. Program Reporting Requirements for Employment,**  
23 **Employment Placement, and Job Training Programs at the Guam Community**  
24 **College, the University of Guam, and the Guam Department of Labor.**

25 (a) The President of the University of Guam, the President of the Guam  
26 Community College, and the Director of the Guam Department of Labor shall  
27 transmit a report to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*

1 no later than June 30 of each year of the actual number of programs completed and/or  
2 certificates issued for each employment, employment placement, and job training  
3 program; and employment data for said program completer for the two (2) years  
4 following completion of their respective programs, to include salary levels, job  
5 location, or whether the job is in the same field as the program.

6 (b) The report mandated in Subsection (a) of this Section shall also be  
7 posted on each agency's respective website.

8 **Section 20. Authorization for Legal Services for the Department of**  
9 **Public Works, the Guam Building Code Council, the Contractors License**  
10 **Board, and the PEALS Board.** The Department of Public Works (DPW), the Guam  
11 Building Code Council (GBCC), the Guam Contractors License Board (GCLB), and  
12 the Guam Board of Professional Engineers, Architects, and Land Surveyors  
13 (PEALS) may enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to jointly fund  
14 an Assistant Attorney General to specifically provide legal services to DPW, GBCC,  
15 GCLB, and the PEALS Board only.

16 **Section 21. Consolidated Revenue and Expenditure Reporting**  
17 **Requirement.** Notwithstanding §§ 4105(f) and 4109(c)(3) of Chapter 4, Title 5  
18 GCA, and § 13109(a)(1) of Chapter 13, Title 2 GCA, relative to General Fund  
19 revenue reporting, the Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research,  
20 in collaboration with the Director of Revenue and Taxation and the Director of  
21 Administration, shall prepare a monthly Consolidated Revenue and Expenditure  
22 Report (CRER) which shall report and recognize revenues on a cash basis, with the  
23 exception of Section 30 revenues, which shall be reported as collected in full in  
24 October of each year; and shall for each month, identify and note any and all non-  
25 recurring revenues by General Fund revenue category, by month collected, and by  
26 amount; and shall compare the budgeted and actual departmental program  
27 appropriations with expenditures and encumbrances. The Director of the Bureau of

1 Budget and Management Research, the Director of Administration, and the Director  
2 of Revenue and Taxation shall certify said reports, which shall be transmitted to *I*  
3 *Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than twenty  
4 (20) days after the end of each month. The reports shall include, at a minimum, the  
5 following components relative to General Fund revenues:

6 (a) comparison of revenues for the preceding month contrasted with  
7 the same month for the prior fiscal year;

8 (b) comparison of year-to-date revenues for the preceding month  
9 contrasted with the same period for the prior fiscal year;

10 (c) comparison of adopted revenues allocated for the preceding  
11 month contrasted with the actual revenues collected for the month;

12 (d) comparison of quarterly adopted revenues allocated for the  
13 preceding quarter contrasted with actual quarterly revenues collected;

14 (e) comparison of year-to-date adopted revenues contrasted with  
15 actual year-to-date revenues collected; and

16 (f) comparison of adopted revenues for the fiscal year contrasted  
17 with actual year-to-date revenues collected plus the remaining projected  
18 revenues to be collected for the remainder of the fiscal year.

19 **Section 22. Payment of Civil Service Commission Settlements or**  
20 **Judgements and Decisions by the Judiciary of Guam.** Any obligations of back  
21 pay owed to compensate employees by a judgment or by a settlement agreement  
22 action of the Civil Service Commission or judgement and decision of the Judiciary  
23 of Guam is hereby appropriated from the Fiscal Year 2022 budget of the respective  
24 agency to which such action is directed.

25 **Section 23. Authorization to Utilize Lapsed Funds from Fiscal Year**  
26 **2021.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* is hereby  
27 authorized to recruit and hire public safety personnel for the Guam Police



1 Department and the Department of Corrections; nurses, public health personnel, and  
2 respiratory therapists for the Department of Public Health and Social Services and  
3 the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority; or behavioral health personnel for the  
4 Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center using lapsed funds from Fiscal Year  
5 2021; provided, that (a) notice is given to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* of  
6 all unaudited potential lapsed funds by agency, program, or other by October 30,  
7 2021; and (b) notice is given to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* of the amount,  
8 source, and intended use of those lapsed funds, five (5) days prior to use.

9 **Section 24. Prevention of Disproportionate Reductions in Allotments.**

10 The Department of Administration and the Bureau of Budget and Management  
11 Research shall not disproportionately reduce the budget allotments to the University  
12 of Guam and the Guam Community College from other units of the government of  
13 Guam.

14 **Section 25. Restrictions on Hiring of Unclassified Employees.** Unless

15 otherwise authorized by this Chapter, no government funds of any kind or  
16 description may be expended for the employment or hiring of unclassified  
17 employees in the Executive Branch of the government of Guam, except for the  
18 following:

19 (a) certified persons at the Guam Department of Education as  
20 identified in § 715(l), Chapter 7, Title 1 GCA;

21 (b) any academic teaching positions at the University of Guam and  
22 the Guam Community College;

23 (c) nurses, doctors, licensed health professionals, contact tracers and  
24 investigators, and ancillary health employees necessary for clinical purposes  
25 at the Department of Public Health and Social Services, the Guam Behavioral  
26 Health and Wellness Center, the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, the

1 Guam Memorial Hospital Authority, the Guam Police Department, and the  
2 Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities;

3 (d) Department of Labor Survey Workers;

4 (e) Systems and Programming Administrator, Junior Systems  
5 Programmer, Senior Programmer Analyst, Junior Application Analyst, Junior  
6 Programmer Analyst, and Junior Application Programmer; and positions  
7 dealing with reporting, tax audits, tax investigations, tax collections, and  
8 processing of taxes at the Department of Revenue and Taxation;

9 (f) federally-funded positions (matching and up to 100%);

10 (g) persons filling temporary vacancies created by the call to active  
11 military duty of employees who are members of the reserve components of  
12 the Department of Defense and the Department of Transportation, including,  
13 but not limited to, the United States Army, United States Navy, United States  
14 Marine Corps, United States Air Force, the Guam Army National Guard, the  
15 Guam Air National Guard, and the United States Coast Guard, or created by  
16 absence due to a long-term disability status which has been certified by a  
17 medical doctor. Departments may exercise this hiring authority provided its  
18 authorized budget for personnel is not exceeded;

19 (h) positions within the Office of *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*, the Office  
20 of *I Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan* and the Guam State Clearinghouse, and  
21 department or agency heads, and private secretaries;

22 (i) positions within the Mayors Council of Guam;

23 (j) positions within the Guam Election Commission;

24 (k) limited-term, part-time substitute teachers of the Guam  
25 Department of Education;

1 (l) all persons employed pursuant to this Section, effective October  
2 1, 2021, shall meet the minimum Knowledge, Abilities, and Skills (KAS)  
3 associated with such position;

4 (m) professional engineers required to fill Chief Engineer positions;

5 (n) positions within the Business Office of the Guam Memorial  
6 Hospital Authority (GMHA) which shall consist of certified coders and  
7 billers;

8 (o) Victim Advocates within the Office of the Attorney General;

9 (p) the Executive Director and staff positions of *I Kumision i Fino'*  
10 *CHamoru yan i Fina'nå'guen i Historia yan Lina'la' i Taotao Tåno'* (the  
11 Commission on *CHamoru* Language and the Teaching of the History and  
12 Culture of the Indigenous People of Guam);

13 (q) Child Protective Services social workers at the Department of  
14 Public Health and Social Services;

15 (r) labor law enforcement specialists;

16 (s) law clerks (7 GCA §9A106.1(a)(1)) with pay grade K Step 1 of  
17 the Competitive Wage Act of 2014, General Pay Plan;

18 (t) the chief financial officer for the Department of Administration;  
19 and

20 (u) customer service representatives at the Guam Department of  
21 Labor.

22 **Section 26. Consolidated Expenditure Report Requirement.** Within thirty  
23 (30) days following each fiscal quarter, the Superintendent of GDOE shall provide  
24 to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, and post on the GDOE website, a consolidated  
25 expenditure report which shall include the authorized spending levels,  
26 encumbrances, and expenditures (quarterly and year-to-date) of GDOE, enumerated

1 by school or division within the department. Such report shall also be transmitted,  
2 by hand-delivery or electronically, to each school principal.

3 **Section 27. Alignment of Hospital Rates and Fees.** Notwithstanding any  
4 other provision of law, the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority (GMHA) is  
5 authorized to formulate a fee and rate schedule of applicable hospital fees and rates.  
6 Upon the completion of a fee study, GMHA shall submit the adjusted fee and rate  
7 schedule to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* by June 30, 2022. Nothing herein shall affect  
8 GMHA's authority to regularly adopt or increase fees.

9 **Section 28. Re-employment of Former Classified Employees in**  
10 **Education, Health, and Public Safety.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
11 for Fiscal Year 2022, former classified teachers, nurses, and public safety first  
12 responders of the government of Guam who were in good standing at the time of  
13 resignation may be re-employed at not less than the salary they earned at their former  
14 position if they apply for the same or comparable job in the same department  
15 regardless of the timespan that the employee left their position. The employee may  
16 waive this privilege.

17 **Section 29. Authorization for Charter Schools to Utilize Unexpended**  
18 **Balances.** The unexpended balances of appropriations from the General Fund to the  
19 Department of Administration in support of the Guam Academy Charter Schools  
20 Council in Fiscal Years 2019, 2020, and 2021 shall not revert to the General Fund  
21 and shall continue to be available until fully expended for the original purposes of  
22 said appropriations and for the purposes of addressing issues caused by the COVID-  
23 19 pandemic.

24 **Section 30. Independence of the Guam Solid Waste Authority from**  
25 **Budgetary Controls of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research.** §  
26 51A116 of Article 1, Chapter 51A, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to  
27 read as follows:

1                   **“§ 51A116. Annual Budget.**

2                   For the purposes of Chapter 51A of Title 10 of the Guam Code  
3                   Annotated, the term annual budget means a balanced budget for expenditures  
4                   of the Guam Solid Waste Authority for a fiscal year to be funded by the  
5                   anticipated revenues and other funds to be received and expended for the same  
6                   fiscal year, submitted by the Authority to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* (the Guam  
7                   Legislature) and approved by law for the next fiscal year. The budget  
8                   approved by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* (the Guam Legislature) is not subject to  
9                   the allotment process or the control of the Bureau of Budget and Management  
10                  Research, nor shall the Governor transfer funds out of the Authority. GSWA  
11                  is authorized to use any carryover unexpended fund balances for purposes of  
12                  this Chapter.”

13                  **Section 31. Competitive Wage Act Study.** *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* is hereby  
14                  authorized to expend such funds necessary to procure the services of a consulting  
15                  expert on classification and compensation in public employment to conduct a study  
16                  of all government of Guam positions, to include positions covered under the Nurse  
17                  and Educator Pay Plans. The scope of work provisions of the contract shall include  
18                  the conducting of compensation training for the human resources staff throughout  
19                  the government of Guam.

20                  **Section 32. Real Property Triennial Re-valuation.** *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*  
21                  is hereby authorized to expend such funds necessary to procure the services for the  
22                  real property tax triennial revaluation.

23                  **Section 33. Excess Annual Leave for Nurses, Employees Working in**  
24                  **Nursing Services, and Peace Officers.** Notwithstanding § 4109(c) of Chapter 4,  
25                  Title 4, Guam Code Annotated, employees working in nursing services at the Guam  
26                  Memorial Hospital Authority, nurses employed at the Department of Public Health  
27                  and Social Services, and Peace Officers, as defined in § 51101(b) of Chapter 51,

1 Title 17, Guam Code Annotated, who have accumulated annual leave in excess of  
2 three hundred twenty (320) hours as of September 30, 2021, may carry over their  
3 excess and shall use the excess amount of leave, prior to retirement or termination  
4 from service. At the time of retirement or termination of service, that portion  
5 permitted to be credited to sick leave shall be so credited and the remainder of the  
6 excess leave, if any, shall be lost. Nothing herein shall allow lump sum compensation  
7 or retirement credit for annual leave in excess of three hundred twenty (320) hours.  
8 Nothing herein shall limit registered nurses from accruing leave in accordance with  
9 § 4109.1, Chapter 4, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated.

10 **Section 34. Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve Allowance.** In accordance  
11 with Public Law 35-59, § 66104.1 of Chapter 66, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated,  
12 is *amended* to read:

13 **“§ 66104.1. Same: Allowance.**

14 Each member of the Civilian Volunteer Police Reserve who  
15 successfully completes probationary requirements as established by the Chief  
16 of Police, and who contributes a minimum of forty-two (42) hours or more  
17 per month, shall receive an allowance of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per  
18 month, to defray the cost of maintenance of their equipment and uniforms.  
19 The Guam Police Department shall identify funds within its department  
20 appropriations to satisfy the intent of this Section.”

21 **Section 35. Community Firefighter Reserve Program Allowance.** §  
22 72A102 of Chapter 72A, Title 10, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to read:

23 **“§ 72A102. Same: Allowance.**

24 Each member of the Community Firefighter Reserve Program who  
25 successfully completes probationary requirements as established by the Fire  
26 Chief and who performs satisfactorily during a month shall receive Five  
27 Hundred Dollars (\$500) for that month, to defray the cost of maintenance of

1 their equipment and uniforms. The Guam Fire Department shall identify funds  
2 within its department appropriations to satisfy the intent of this Section.

3 For the initial year of its establishment, the Guam Fire Department shall  
4 be allotted no more than twenty-five (25) firefighter reserve positions and may  
5 increase its recruitment of reserve firefighters for the program in any given  
6 year thereafter to no more than a total of fifty (50) firefighter reserve positions  
7 at any time.”

8 **Section 36. Civilian Volunteer Conservation Officer Reserve Allowance.**

9 § 63103.1(f) of Article 1, Chapter 63, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to  
10 read:

11 “(f) Same: Allowance. Each member of the Civilian Volunteer  
12 Conservation Officer Reserve who successfully completes probationary  
13 requirements as established by the Director and who contributes a minimum  
14 of forty-two (42) hours or more per month, shall receive an allowance of  
15 (\$500) per month, to defray the cost of maintenance of their equipment and  
16 uniforms. The Department of Agriculture shall identify funds within  
17 department appropriations or other appropriate funding sources to satisfy the  
18 requirements of this Section.”

19 **Section 37. Civilian Volunteer Airport Police Reserve Allowance. §**

20 1112.3(e) of Article 1, Chapter 1, Title 12, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to  
21 read:

22 “(e) Same: Allowance. Each member of the Civilian Volunteer  
23 Airport Police Reserve who successfully completes probationary  
24 requirements as established by the Chief of Airport Police, and who  
25 contributes a minimum of forty-two (42) hours or more per month, shall  
26 receive an allowance of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per month, to defray the  
27 cost of maintenance of their equipment and uniforms. The Authority shall

1 identify funds within department appropriations to satisfy the intent of this  
2 Section.”

3 **Section 38. Advance Payment for Medicines Allowed.** A new § 5013 is  
4 *added* to Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, to read as follows:

5 “§ 5013. Advance Payment for Medicines Allowed.  
6 Notwithstanding 5 GCA § 5007 or any other provision of law, the Guam  
7 Memorial Hospital Authority may procure pharmaceuticals with advance  
8 payments.”

9 **Section 39.** § 77113.1 of Article 1, Chapter 77, Title 10, Guam Code  
10 Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

11 “§ 77113.1. Annual Police Training Cycle.

12 (a) The Guam Police Department shall, beginning in Fiscal Year  
13 2017, conduct a police training cycle for no more than forty (40) candidates  
14 per fiscal year.

15 (b) Each year, the Chief of Police shall determine the total cost to  
16 conduct a recruitment and training cycle pursuant to the requirements set forth  
17 in Subsection (a) of this Section, and he/she shall transmit this as part of the  
18 Department’s proposed budget to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* for inclusion in the  
19 Executive Budget request that *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* submits annually to *I*  
20 *Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

21 (c) The Chief of Police shall submit a report to *I Maga'hågan*  
22 *Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than June 30 of  
23 each year to present an update on the police training cycle conducted during  
24 that fiscal year pursuant to the requirements set forth in this Section.”

25 **Section 40.** A new § 73155 is hereby *added* to Article 1 of Chapter 73, Title  
26 5, Guam Code Annotated, to read as follows:

27 “§ 73155. Annual Customs Officer Training Cycle.



1 (a) The Customs and Quarantine Agency shall conduct a customs  
2 officer training cycle for no more than twenty (20) candidates per fiscal year.

3 (b) Each year, the Director of the Customs and Quarantine Agency  
4 shall determine the total cost to conduct a recruitment and training cycle  
5 pursuant to the requirements set forth in Subsection (a) of this Section and  
6 he/she shall transmit this as part of the agency's proposed budget to *I*  
7 *Maga'hågan Guåhan* for inclusion in the Executive Budget request that *I*  
8 *Maga'hågan Guåhan* submits annually to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

9 (c) The Director of the Customs and Quarantine Agency shall  
10 submit a report to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan*  
11 *Guåhan* no later than June 30 of each year to present an update on the customs  
12 officer training cycle conducted during that fiscal year pursuant to the  
13 requirements set forth in this Section.”

14 **Section 41.** A new § 72111 is hereby *added* to Chapter 72 of Title 10, Guam  
15 Code Annotated, to read as follows:

16 “§ 72111. **Annual Firefighter Recruits Training Cycle.**

17 (a) The Guam Fire Department shall conduct a firefighter recruits  
18 training cycle for at least twenty (20) candidates per fiscal year.

19 (b) Each year, the Chief of the Guam Fire Department shall  
20 determine the total cost to conduct a recruitment and training cycle pursuant  
21 to the requirements set forth in Subsection (a) of this Section and he/she shall  
22 transmit this as part of the Department's proposed budget to *I Maga'hågan*  
23 *Guåhan* for inclusion in the Executive Budget request that *I Maga'hågan*  
24 *Guåhan* submits annually to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

25 (c) The Chief of the Guam Fire Department shall submit a report to  
26 *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than  
27 June 30 of each year to present an update on the firefighter recruits training

1 cycle conducted during that fiscal year pursuant to the requirements set forth  
2 in this Section.”

3 **Section 42.** A new § 90.50 is hereby *added* to Article 1 of Chapter 90, Title  
4 9, Guam Code Annotated, to read as follows:

5 **“§ 90.50. Annual Corrections Officer Recruits Training Cycle.**

6 (a) The Department of Corrections shall conduct a corrections  
7 officer recruits training cycle for at least twenty (20) candidates per fiscal  
8 year.

9 (b) Each year, the Director of the Department of Corrections shall  
10 determine the total cost to conduct a recruitment and training cycle pursuant  
11 to the requirements set forth in Subsection (a) of this Section and he/she shall  
12 transmit this as part of the Department’s proposed budget to *I Maga'hågan*  
13 *Guåhan* for inclusion in the Executive Budget request that *I Maga'hågan*  
14 *Guåhan* submits annually to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

15 (c) The Director of the Department of Corrections shall submit a  
16 report to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no  
17 later than June 30 of each year to present an update on the corrections officer  
18 recruits training cycle conducted during that fiscal year pursuant to the  
19 requirements set forth in this Section.”

20 **Section 43.** A new § 51102.40 is hereby *added* to Chapter 51 of Title 17,  
21 Guam Code Annotated, to read as follows:

22 **“§ 51102.40. Authorization to Establish a Standardized and**  
23 **Uniformed Law Enforcement Officer General Force Leadership**  
24 **Structure Tier and Pay Scale Plan for Peace Officers.**

25 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Commission is  
26 authorized to establish a Standardized and Uniformed Law Enforcement  
27 Officer General Force Leadership Structure and Pay Scale Plan for Category

1 Peace Officers, as defined pursuant to Chapter 3 of 27 GAR. The  
2 Commission shall have up to one (1) year from the enactment of this Section  
3 to complete this plan, and the plan shall be presented to *I Liheslaturan Guahan*  
4 no later than thirty (30) days upon completion for review and consideration.

5 The Commission shall develop a Law Enforcement Officer General  
6 Schedule which shall identify a general base salary and pay grades of the law  
7 enforcement officers of the classified service. Grades shall be identified to be  
8 commensurate with the appropriate levels of duties and responsibilities as it  
9 relates to basic, supervisory, and management responsibilities. Step pay shall  
10 be established with minimum and maximum salaries identified in the various  
11 steps. Salaries for each respective law enforcement officer position as it relates  
12 to the law enforcement officer force structure shall be established within each  
13 pay grade according to cumulative years of service. The Commission shall  
14 include the advisories of the Guam Federation of Teachers (GFT) and the  
15 Civil Service Commission (CSC) in the completion of the pay scale plan.”

16 **Section 44. Inclusion of Guam Community College in Certification Pay**  
17 **Differential for Certified Professionals.**

18 (a) Subsection (a) of § 6235, Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code  
19 Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read:

20 “§ 6235. **Certification Pay Differential for Certified Public**  
21 **Accountant, Certified Government Financial Manager, Certified Fraud**  
22 **Examiner, and Certified Internal Auditor.**

23 (a) The Director of the Department of Administration shall ensure  
24 the following classified and/or unclassified accounting, auditing, budgeting,  
25 and management professional positions within government of Guam line  
26 agencies, the Office of Public Accountability, the University of Guam, the  
27 Guam Community College, and the Guam Department of Education shall be

1 given a one-time incentive pay compensation as provided pursuant to this  
2 Section, to include, as follows:

3 POSITION COMPENSATION

4 Certified Public Accountant (CPA)

5 Certified Government Financial Manager (CGFM)

6 Certified Fraud Examiner (CFE)

7 Certified Internal Auditor (CIA)”

8 (b) Subsection (b)(2) of § 6235, Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code  
9 Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read:

10 “(2) *Accounting, Auditing, Budgeting, and Management Professional*  
11 means any employee in the government of Guam line agencies, the Office of  
12 Public Accountability, the University of Guam, the Guam Community  
13 College, or the Guam Department of Education who are essential for the  
14 delivery, maintenance, and preparation of the financial statements and fiscal  
15 management of the government of Guam.”

16 (c) Subsection (d)(1) of § 6235, Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code  
17 Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read:

18 “(1) All government of Guam line employees, the Office of Public  
19 Accountability, the University of Guam, the Guam Community College, and  
20 the Guam Department of Education employees who have obtained a  
21 nationally recognized certification as a Certified Public Accountant (CPA),  
22 Certified Government Financial Manager (CGFM), Certified Fraud Examiner  
23 (CFE), or Certified Internal Auditor (CIA) shall be entitled to receive a single  
24 certification pay differential.”

25 (d) Subsection (d)(5) of § 6235, Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code  
26 Annotated, is hereby *amended* to read:

1           “(5) The Director of Administration, the President of the Guam  
2 Community College, and the President of the University of Guam shall  
3 implement a single certification pay differential for all the CPA, CGFM, CFE,  
4 and CIA who are active in their area of certification. Accounting, auditing,  
5 budgeting, and management professionals who have a national or Guam board  
6 certification shall be entitled to the certification pay differential provided in  
7 Item (1) of this Subsection, calculated at the rates above, added to the base  
8 pay to rectify an inequity in certification pay.”

9           (e) Subsections (e) and (f) of § 6235, Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam  
10 Code Annotated, are hereby *amended* to read:

11           “(e) Developmental Promotions (KPP) Designation. Government of  
12 Guam line agencies, the Office of Public Accountability, the University of  
13 Guam, the Guam Community College, and the Guam Department of  
14 Education who recruit professionals in accounting, auditing, budgeting, or  
15 management shall be authorized to hire such professionals as ‘known-  
16 promotional-potential’ on the basis of CPA, CGFM, CIA, or CFE  
17 certifications, as provided in the Government of Guam Personnel Rules and  
18 Regulations and Operations Procedure Manual. A KPP qualified employee  
19 shall be entitled to the pay differential provided in one (1) initial certification  
20 pay increase based on Subsection (c).”

21           “(f) Implementation. The Director of Administration, the President  
22 of the Guam Community College, and the President of the University of Guam  
23 shall transmit a status report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* every  
24 quarter after the enactment of this Act, and upon the implementation of the  
25 provisions within this Act.”

26           **Section 45.** § 6224 of Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated,  
27 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

1           **“§ 6224. Police and Customs Officers--Hazardous Pay.**

2           A police and customs officer assigned to a hazardous duty position is entitled  
3 to hazardous duty pay calculated at the rate of such officer’s wage plus ten  
4 percent (10%).”

5           **Section 46.** § 6225 of Article 2, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam Code Annotated,  
6 is hereby *amended* to read as follows:

7           **“§ 6225. Hazardous Duty Positions Identified.**

8           (a) The Chief of Police shall, by general order, adopt a Table of  
9 Organization and Equipment (TOE) for the uniform positions within the  
10 Police Department. The TOE shall follow generally the organizational  
11 structure established by the reorganization plan for the Police Department  
12 which became effective September 11, 1989. The TOE shall identify by rank  
13 and duty the positions within the various units, sections, branches, divisions  
14 and commands in the Police Department. Hazardous duty positions shall be  
15 identified in the TOE.

16           (b) The Director of Customs shall, by general order, adopt a Table  
17 of Organization and Equipment (TOE) for the uniform positions within the  
18 Customs and Quarantine Agency. The TOE shall follow generally the  
19 organizational structure established by the creation of the Customs and  
20 Quarantine Agency which became effective on October 1, 1994. The TOE  
21 shall identify by rank and duty the positions within the various units, sections,  
22 branches, divisions, and commands in the Customs and Quarantine Agency.  
23 Hazardous duty positions shall be identified in the TOE.

24           (c)(1) Notwithstanding § 6304 of Article 3, Chapter 6, Title 4, Guam  
25 Code Annotated, the Civil Service Commission Hazardous/Environmental  
26 Pay Policy and Procedures, or any other provision of law, rule, regulation, and

1 Executive Order, and for the purposes of this Act, hazardous duty positions  
2 shall be identified as follows:

3 (A) all sworn Officers of the Guam Airport Police;

4 (B) all sworn Conservation Officers of the Division of Aquatic  
5 and Wildlife Resources of the Department of Agriculture;

6 (C) all sworn Guam Park Patrol Officers of the Department of  
7 Parks and Recreation;

8 (D) those employed by the Department of Youth Affairs, or  
9 who are assigned to the Department of Youth Affairs, and who are  
10 engaged in juvenile detention and rehabilitation work at the Department  
11 of Youth Affairs;

12 (E) those employed by the Office of the Attorney General  
13 whom he or she specifically designates; and

14 (F) all sworn Officers of the Guam Fire Department.

15 (2) The appointing authorities of the A.B. Won Pat International  
16 Airport Authority, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Parks  
17 and Recreation, the Department of Youth Affairs, the Office of the Attorney  
18 General, the Guam Fire Department, and the Department of Administration  
19 shall identify the direct exposure personnel, and upon exposure, who shall be  
20 entitled to the ten percent (10%) hazardous pay differential.”

21 **Section 47. Increasing the Provision for Tax Refund Payments in Public**

22 **Law 35-99.** Notwithstanding any other provision or law, the amount listed under  
23 Withholding Taxes, Interest, and Penalties in Section I (A) of Chapter I of Public  
24 Law 35-99 is increased from \$230,533,587 to \$250,533,587 and the amount listed  
25 under Provision for Tax Refund Payments in Section I (A) and Section 3 of Chapter  
26 I of Public Law 35-99 is increased from \$125,000,000 to \$145,000,000. The  
27 additional \$20,000,000 in the increase to the Withholding Taxes, Interest, and

1 Penalties in FY 2021 shall be immediately deposited directly into the Income Tax  
2 Refund Efficient Payment Trust Fund of Chapter 51, Title 11 GCA and applied to  
3 ‘A-Status’ returns.

4 **Section 48. Amendment to BBMR Allotment Release Control.** § 1303.1  
5 of Chapter 1, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, is *amended* to read:

6 **“§ 1303.1. Exemption from BBMR Allotment Release Control.**

7 Section 1303 of this Chapter shall not apply to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*  
8 (including the Office of Finance and Budget), the Public Defender Service  
9 Corporation, the Unified Judiciary of Guam, the Mayors Council of Guam, the  
10 Office of Public Accountability, the Office of the Attorney General, the Guam  
11 Memorial Hospital Authority, the Guam Visitors Bureau, the University of Guam,  
12 the Guam Community College, the Guam Election Commission, Guam Ancestral  
13 Lands Commission, and the Chamorro Land Trust Commission. Said entities may  
14 draw against their respective appropriations as needed to meet their obligations in  
15 accordance with a drawdown schedule that said entities shall submit to the Director  
16 of Administration no later than October 31 of each fiscal year. If an entity fails to  
17 submit such drawdown schedule by October 31 of each fiscal year the Director of  
18 Administration may withhold a drawdown request for the current fiscal year until  
19 such time the entity submits its drawdown schedule for the entire fiscal year. The  
20 Director of Administration shall not, for any reason, withhold any amount  
21 appropriated by *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* to the Guam Election Commission.”

22 **Section 49. Continuing Appropriation Authorization.** Notwithstanding  
23 any other provision of law, the allotted but unexpended balance of funds  
24 appropriated to the University of Guam for Fiscal Year 2021 shall not lapse and shall  
25 continue to be available until fully expended.

26 **Section 50. Continuing Appropriation Authorization.** Notwithstanding  
27 any other provision of law, the allotted but unexpended balance of funds



- 1 appropriated to the Guam Community College for Fiscal Year 2021 shall not lapse
- 2 and shall continue to be available until fully expended.

1 **CHAPTER XIII**

2 **ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

3 **PART I – SPENDING CONTROLS ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

4 **Section 1. Government-Funded Travel Prohibited.** Funds appropriated  
5 by this Act shall not be expended for off-island travel or per diem expenses by  
6 government employees and officials, except for:

7 (a) travel that is federally-funded;

8 (b) travel that is specifically required to administer or secure federal  
9 grants;

10 (c) travel to promote tourism on Guam; provided, that such travel is  
11 paid for by the Tourist Attraction Fund and is restricted to the GVB General  
12 Manager or his/her designee, and appropriate GVB staff and cultural  
13 performers as are identified by the Board of Directors as necessary to  
14 accomplish the goal of the travel;

15 (d) travel by law enforcement personnel conducting an official  
16 investigation and law enforcement personnel providing escort services for  
17 criminal suspects, detainees, and convicted felons being returned to Guam for  
18 judicial proceedings or being transferred to off-island correctional facilities;

19 (e) travel by medical personnel providing escort services for patients  
20 requiring off-island medical treatment and other escorts as specifically  
21 authorized by the Department of Public Health and Social Services pursuant  
22 to Guam law;

23 (f) travel necessary for the enforcement of court orders;

24 (g) travel under the Residential Treatment Fund;

25 (h) travel required for witnesses testifying on behalf of, and  
26 government attorneys representing the government or the people of Guam in  
27 a criminal or civil case;

1 (i) travel to attend conferences and official meetings with national  
2 and regional government officials or national and regional organizations of  
3 which the entity is an official member where attendance is necessary to  
4 advancing Guam's interests during Fiscal Year 2022 and as approved by a  
5 governing board or Director;

6 (j) Executive Security functions under the Guam Police Department  
7 for the purpose of providing Executive Security to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* and  
8 *I Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan* when traveling off-island to represent the  
9 people of Guam at meetings and functions determined critical to the welfare  
10 of Guam;

11 (k) travel to testify on issues related to Guam's political status; or

12 (l) travel to testify at the invitation of the U.S. Congress on  
13 legislation that is supported by the Guam Legislature as indicated by a  
14 legislative resolution.

15 **Section 2. Wireless Communications Restrictions.**

16 (a) No government of Guam funds, regardless of source and including  
17 funds expended by autonomous agencies, shall be expended for the use of cellular  
18 telephones, cellular telephone services, and other wireless telephone services, unless  
19 the government of Guam will be reimbursed by federal funds or other grants. This  
20 Section shall not apply to *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*; *I Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan*;  
21 the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*; the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of  
22 Guam; the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court of Guam; the Crisis Hotline  
23 Program of the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center; law enforcement  
24 officials; on-call attorneys of the Office of the Attorney General and the Public  
25 Defender Service Corporation; on-call health professionals of the Guam Memorial  
26 Hospital Authority, the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center, and the  
27 Department of Public Health and Social Services; village Mayors and Vice Mayors;

1 Guam Fire Department and EMS officials; on-call emergency management  
2 personnel; the Chief Medical Examiner; the Guam Election Commission; and the  
3 Guam Visitors Bureau. The restrictions in this Section shall not apply to wireless  
4 internet services, stationary (non-mobile) wireless telephone, and wireless voice  
5 over internet protocol (VOIP) services.

6 (b) No appointing authority, manager, supervisor, or public officer in any  
7 branch of the government of Guam shall require or exert undue influence on any  
8 classified or unclassified employee of any branch of the government of Guam to  
9 maintain or utilize for employment-related duties, at such employee's personal  
10 expense, any form of wireless and/or internet communications, phone, tablet, or  
11 desktop or laptop computer. Nothing herein, however, shall be construed to prevent  
12 an employer from calling an employee at a wireless phone/radio if the employee  
13 designates such wireless phone/radio as a personal contact number. Nothing herein  
14 shall be construed as to prevent an employee, voluntarily and on his own accord,  
15 from using personal funds or resources for wireless telephone services. An employee  
16 in violation of this Subsection is subject to a fine not to exceed Fifty Dollars (\$50.00)  
17 for the first violation, and One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for subsequent violations.

18 **Section 3. Restriction on the Home Use of Government of Guam**  
19 **Vehicles.** Except as expressly permitted by § 1103(c), Chapter 1, Title 4 GCA, or  
20 any other law, no government of Guam owned, leased, or rented vehicle may be  
21 driven home by an employee unless such employee is on call as an emergency first  
22 responder.

23 **Section 4. Annual Procurement Plan Requirement.** Pursuant to § 5010  
24 of Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated, departments and agencies shall submit  
25 to the General Services Agency (GSA) a projected annual procurement plan at the  
26 start of each fiscal year. Plans shall include equipment, services, and supplies (e.g.,  
27 vehicles, copiers, computers, heavy equipment, security, ground maintenance,

1 janitorial and construction supplies, food supplies, etc.), by category, together with  
2 appropriate specifications or scope of work.

3 **Section 5. Purchasing First Class or Business Class Airfare Prohibited.**

4 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation to the contrary, the  
5 government of Guam shall not purchase first class or business class airfare. They  
6 shall be authorized to purchase only coach or economy airfare. Any employee  
7 electing to upgrade their airline seat shall be required to either use their personal  
8 mileage or pay the incremental difference in the cost.



1           **Section 5. Facilities Insurance Requirements.** Every department and  
2 agency of the government of Guam through the Department of Administration shall  
3 only expend such sums as necessary from the department's or agency's  
4 appropriation for operations contained in this Act for insurance of government-  
5 owned facilities built or repaired with FEMA grant funds where such insurance is  
6 required by FEMA.

7           **Section 6. Reporting Requirements for Non-Profit Organizations.** All  
8 non-profit organizations that receive funds pursuant to this Act shall maintain  
9 financial records that accurately account for said funds and shall provide a budgetary  
10 breakdown by object category to the department or agency that oversees the  
11 appropriation. The non-profit organization shall be provided a copy of this Section  
12 by the department or agency overseeing such appropriation, but failure of the  
13 department or agency to fulfill this duty shall not prevent any non-profit organization  
14 from carrying out its responsibilities under this Section. The non-profit organization  
15 shall also provide to said department or agency:

16           (a) a quarterly report describing its activities during the reporting  
17 period and the results it achieved no later than twenty (20) days after the end  
18 of each quarter;

19           (b) notice of all procurement of equipment and services of Five  
20 Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or more prior to awarding any such contract;

21           (c) access by the overseeing department's or agency's duly  
22 authorized representative and government of Guam auditors to appropriate  
23 records for the purpose of audit and examination of books, documents, papers,  
24 and records of funds expended under the appropriation;

25           (d) submission of a detailed inventory listing of each year's  
26 purchases, as certified by its certifying officer; and

1 (e) a final report to the overseeing department or agency for  
2 submission to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* containing a full disclosure of all  
3 expenditures of funds appropriated by this Act no later than November 15,  
4 2022, for Fiscal Year 2022. The overseeing department or agency shall submit  
5 said report to *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and shall post the same on its website.

6 Non-compliance with these reporting requirements shall subject the  
7 non-profit organization to a three percent (3%) reduction of its appropriation;  
8 and the overseeing department's or agency's contract with the organization  
9 shall so provide.

10 **Section 7. Fund Reversions.** Unless otherwise specified in this Act:

11 (a) **General Fund Reversion.** All unexpended or unencumbered  
12 appropriations made from the General Fund by a GG1, purchase order, or contract  
13 pursuant to this Act shall revert to the General Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year  
14 2022.

15 (b) **Healthy Futures Fund Reversion.** All unexpended or unencumbered  
16 appropriations made from the Healthy Futures Fund by a GG1, purchase order, or  
17 contract pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Healthy Futures Fund on the last day  
18 of Fiscal Year 2022.

19 (c) **Guam Educational Facilities Fund Reversion.** All unexpended or  
20 unencumbered appropriations made from the Guam Educational Facilities Fund by  
21 a GG1, purchase order, or contract pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Guam  
22 Educational Facilities Fund on the last day of Fiscal Year 2022.

23 (d) **Guam Highway Fund Reversion.** All unexpended or unencumbered  
24 appropriations made from the Guam Highway Fund by a GG1, purchase order, or  
25 contract pursuant to this Act shall revert to the Guam Highway Fund on the last day  
26 of Fiscal Year 2022.



1           **Section 8. General Fund Transfer Authority of *I Maga'hågan Guåhan*.**

2 Unless otherwise restricted or specifically allowed by this Act for Fiscal Year 2022,  
3 *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* is authorized to transfer up to five percent (5%) between  
4 Fiscal Year 2022 General Fund Executive Branch appropriations as directed in this  
5 Section. No transfer shall be authorized unless the Appropriation Allocation Report  
6 required in Section 12 of Part II of this Chapter is submitted pursuant to that Section.  
7 Any transfer between object categories and object groups or agencies after the  
8 submission of the Appropriation Allocation Report in Section 12 of Part II of this  
9 Chapter shall be required to be reported to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*  
10 and the Office of Finance and Budget no later than five (5) working days after the  
11 transfer is made. Failure to submit any reports by the required deadline in this  
12 Section shall result in a Two Hundred Fifty Dollar (\$250.00) fine per missed  
13 deadline for the Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research, which  
14 shall be deposited in the GDOE Interscholastic Sports Fund.

15           Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no funds shall be transferred out  
16 of the Guam Department of Education Operations Fund or the Fiscal Year 2022  
17 General and Special Fund appropriations made to the Guam Department of  
18 Education, the Unified Judiciary, *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, the Office of Finance and  
19 Budget, the Mayors Council of Guam, the Public Defender Service Corporation, the  
20 Guam Ancestral Lands Commission, the *Chamorro* Land Trust Commission, the  
21 Office of the Attorney General, the Guam Election Commission, and the Office of  
22 Public Accountability.

23           **Section 9. Uniform Allowances.** Notwithstanding any provision of law,  
24 uniform allowances authorized in this Act shall not be less than One Hundred Fifty  
25 Dollars (\$150.00) for the fiscal year and shall be issued to the employees no later  
26 than the end of the first (1<sup>st</sup>) quarter of Fiscal Year 2022.

27           **Section 10. Government Staffing Pattern.**

1 (a) Staffing Pattern. No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each  
2 quarter of Fiscal Year 2022, every director, administrator, or head of a government  
3 of Guam agency, excluding line agencies, shall submit to the Speaker of *I*  
4 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* in a Microsoft Excel file and written report, and post the same  
5 on the agency website, a current staffing pattern in the format of the Executive  
6 Branch Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Call as of the previous quarter's ending. The  
7 agencies required to submit are autonomous and semi-autonomous agencies, public  
8 corporations, the Mayors Council of Guam, and the Unified Judiciary. Said staffing  
9 pattern shall include, at minimum, the name of every current employee and his/her  
10 position title, most recent hire date, salary, increment costs and benefit costs, the  
11 funding source for his/her salary and benefits, and the gross salary and benefits paid  
12 for during the quarter.

13 (b) No later than thirty (30) days after the end of each quarter of Fiscal Year  
14 2022, the Director of the Department of Administration shall post the government-  
15 wide line agency staffing pattern on the designated budget website in a Microsoft  
16 Excel file and written report. The format of the report shall be the current staffing  
17 pattern in the format of the Executive Branch Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Call as of the  
18 previous quarter's ending. Said staffing pattern shall include, at minimum, the name  
19 of every current employee and his/her position title, most recent hire date, salary,  
20 increment costs and benefit costs, the funding source for his/her salary and benefits,  
21 and the gross salary and benefits paid for during the quarter.

22 **Section 11. Funding Source.** The following departments are authorized to  
23 expend up to the level of revenues collected for their respective special revenue  
24 funds for Fiscal Year 2022 and unexpended carryovers in revolving funds authorized  
25 by law only for the purposes authorized by statute for those funds:

26 (a) Guam Police Department – Police Services Fund; and Police  
27 Patrol Vehicle and Equipment Revolving Fund;

- 1           (b) Department of Corrections – Corrections Revolving Fund;
- 2           (c) Customs and Quarantine Agency – Customs, Agriculture and  
3 Quarantine Inspection Services Fund;
- 4           (d) Guam Environmental Protection Agency – Air Pollution Control  
5 Special Fund; Guam Environmental Trust Fund; Pesticide Management Fund;  
6 Water Protection Fund; Water Research and Development Fund; and  
7 Recycling Revolving Fund;
- 8           (e) Department of Land Management – Land Survey Revolving  
9 Fund;
- 10          (f) Department of Agriculture – Guam Plant Inspection and Permit  
11 Fund; Guam Invasive Species Inspection Fee Fund; and Rabies Prevention  
12 Fund;
- 13          (g) Guam Board of Registration for Professional Engineers,  
14 Architects and Land Surveyors (PEALS) - PEALS Board Fund;
- 15          (h) Guam Fire Department – Enhanced 911 Emergency Reporting  
16 System Fund; and Fire, Life and Medical Emergency Fund;
- 17          (i) Guam Regional Transit Authority – Public Transit Fund;
- 18          (j) Guam Contractors License Board – Contractors License Board  
19 Fund;
- 20          (k) Department of Revenue and Taxation – Tax Collection  
21 Enhancement Fund; Banking and Insurance Enforcement Fund; and  
22 Alcoholic Beverage Compliance Fees and Fines Fund;
- 23          (l) Department of Public Health and Social Services – Guam  
24 Environmental Health Fund; Health Professional Licensing Office Revolving  
25 Fund; Office of Vital Statistics Revolving Fund; and Sanitary Inspection  
26 Revolving Fund;

1 (m) Department of Parks and Recreation – Public Recreation  
2 Services Fund;

3 (n) Guam Department of Education – Public School Library  
4 Resources Fund;

5 (o) Department of Labor and the Guam Community College –  
6 Manpower Development Fund;

7 (p) Office of the Attorney General – Victim/Witness Travel-  
8 Housing Fund; Consumer Protection Fund; Criminal Injuries Compensation  
9 Fund; and Notary Public Revolving Fund;

10 (q) Chamorro Land Trust Commission – Chamorro Land Trust  
11 Operations Fund and Chamorro Land Trust Commission Survey and  
12 Infrastructure Fund;

13 (r) Department of Chamorro Affairs - Guam Museum Fund;

14 (s) Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center - Mental Health  
15 and Substance Abuse Services Fund; and

16 (t) Guam Ethics Commission – Government Ethics Fund.

17 **Section 12. Appropriation Allocation Report.** No later than October 15,  
18 2021, the Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research shall submit  
19 to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* and the Office of Finance and Budget a  
20 written Appropriation Allocation Report and Microsoft Excel file, identifying the  
21 amount of the appropriations in Chapter II-Part V; Chapter III-Parts II, III and IV;  
22 and Chapter V of this Act; by AS400 account number, appropriation type,  
23 appropriation year, fund code, agency code, division code, program code, and object  
24 category. This Report shall include this information for all the departments and  
25 agencies in Chapter II-Part V; Chapter III-Parts II, III and IV; and Chapter V of this  
26 Act. Failure to submit this report by the deadline shall result in a Two Hundred Fifty

1 Dollar (\$250.00) fine for the Director of the Bureau of Budget and Management  
2 Research, which shall be deposited in the GDOE Interscholastic Sports Fund.

3 **Section 13. Government of Guam Health Insurance Program Reporting.**

4 (a) All health insurance carriers for the government of Guam shall submit  
5 a monthly written report, and corresponding Microsoft Excel file of said report,  
6 aggregating the data relative to (1) enrollees, both subscribers and dependents, by  
7 active employee and retiree subscriber counts, by plan, by class, by groups,  
8 supported/paid by the General Fund, detailed by agency/department; and (2)  
9 enrollees, both subscribers and dependents, by active employee and retiree  
10 subscriber counts, by plan, by class, by groups, supported/paid by autonomous  
11 agencies of the government of Guam, detailed by autonomous agency.

12 For purposes of this Subsection, autonomous agencies shall include the Guam  
13 Power Authority, the Guam Waterworks Authority, the Port Authority of Guam, the  
14 A.B. Won Pat International Airport Authority, the Guam Housing Corporation, the  
15 Guam Economic Development Authority, the Government of Guam Retirement  
16 Fund, and the Guam Visitors Bureau.

17 This report and corresponding Microsoft Excel file shall be submitted to the  
18 Department of Administration, the Office of Finance and Budget, *I Maga'hågan*  
19 *Guåhan*, and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than twenty (20) days  
20 after the end of each month of Fiscal Year 2022.

21 (b) All health insurance carriers for the government of Guam shall submit  
22 a monthly written report detailing each individual health insurance premium  
23 payment received by the government of Guam health insurance carrier from the  
24 government of Guam, by date and by agency, to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan*  
25 *Guåhan* no later than twenty (20) days after the end of each month of Fiscal Year  
26 2022.

1           **Section 14. Appropriations Reserve Report.** The Director of the Bureau of  
2 Budget and Management Research shall submit a quarterly report within thirty (30)  
3 days after each quarter to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*, in a Microsoft Excel  
4 file and written report, of the reserves held on any appropriations in this Act, detailed  
5 by amount and by AS400 account number.

6           **Section 15. Quarterly Reports of Medical Referral Offices.** Each of the  
7 Medical Referral Offices funded by this Act shall provide quarterly reports on its  
8 activities and expenditures, to include, but not be limited to:

- 9           (a) number of referred patients served;
- 10           (b) number of patient escorts or accompanying family members served;
- 11           (c) average cost per patient referral incurred during that quarter;
- 12           (d) actual office expenditures for the quarter, including fuel costs; and
- 13           (e) a description of services provided during the quarter.

14           The quarterly reports required by this Section shall be submitted to *I*  
15 *Maga'hågan Guåhan* and the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no later than thirty  
16 (30) days after the end of each quarter of the fiscal year and shall be posted on the  
17 Offices' websites.

18           **Section 16. Audited Financial Statements Supplementary Information.**  
19 The Public Auditor and the Director of the Department of Administration shall  
20 ensure that the Fiscal Year 2021 audit of the government of Guam financial  
21 statements contains the following supplementary information:

- 22           (a) a schedule of personnel count indicating the number of filled  
23 positions by department, fund source, and amount expended as of September  
24 30, 2021; and
- 25           (b) a combined schedule of expenditures, encumbrances, and  
26 continuing appropriations by department, fund source, and object  
27 classification as of September 30, 2021.

1           **Section 17. Reporting Requirements for Travel.** All governmental entities  
2 (including line and autonomous agencies), instrumentalities, and public corporations  
3 shall submit a quarterly report of all off-island government travel that is publicly  
4 funded during Fiscal Year 2022. This report shall be submitted to the Speaker of *I*  
5 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* and shall include:

6           (1) the name of the traveler;

7           (2) the source of funds;

8           (3) the purpose of the travel;

9           (4) the cost of the travel; and

10           (5) individual or group reports from the travelers highlighting the  
11 impact the information gathered at the conference or meeting has on the  
12 agency, and how the information acquired will be beneficial to the agency's  
13 function.

14           A presentation of the information obtained from the meetings and conferences  
15 may be required at the discretion of the agency's director.

16           **Section 18. Guam Police Department (GPD), Guam Fire Department**  
17 **(GFD), Customs and Quarantine Agency (CQA), and Department of**  
18 **Corrections (DOC) Overtime Reporting Requirements.** The GPD, GFD, CQA  
19 and DOC shall submit a written report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan* no  
20 later than twenty (20) days after the end of each quarter in Fiscal Year 2022 which  
21 shall include the amount of overtime owed to each employee at each respective  
22 agency, by fiscal year in which such overtime was incurred, by division, and by  
23 employee name, for the previous quarter. Failure to submit said report no later than  
24 twenty (20) days after the end of each quarter in Fiscal Year 2022 shall result in a  
25 fine of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) per missed deadline for either the Chief  
26 of Police, the Fire Chief, the Director of the Customs and Quarantine Agency, or the

1 Director of the Department of Corrections, which shall be deposited in the GDOE  
2 Interscholastic Sports Fund.

3 **Section 19. Independent Contractors.** The Office of *I Maga'hågan*  
4 *Guåhan*, the Office of *I Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan*, and the Guam State  
5 Clearinghouse may enter into agreements with independent contractors pursuant to  
6 Guam procurement laws.

7 **Section 20. Authorization for Payment of Prior Years' Obligations.**  
8 Appropriations made in this Act may be expended for the payment of prior years'  
9 obligations; provided, that it does not negatively impact the current operational  
10 needs of the department or agency requesting such prior years' payment, and that  
11 five (5) days prior to payment, written notice is given to the Speaker of *I*  
12 *Liheslaturan Guåhan* with the total amount, funding source, and the prior years'  
13 obligation to be paid for by the department or agency.

14 **Section 21. Department of Revenue and Taxation Authorization to**  
15 **Utilize the Better Public Service Fund for Tax Collection.** Notwithstanding  
16 any other provision of law, the Department of Revenue and Taxation is hereby  
17 authorized to use its appropriation in this Act from the Better Public Service Fund  
18 for the purpose of tax collection.

19 **Section 22. *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* Prohibited from Expending Excess**  
20 **Fiscal Year 2021 and Fiscal Year 2022 Revenues.** Notwithstanding any other  
21 provision of law, rule, or regulation, and consistent with Section 4 of Chapter I of  
22 this Act, *I Maga'hågan Guåhan* shall not expend General Fund revenues collected  
23 in excess of the adopted revenues as the basis for the appropriations contained in  
24 Public Law 35-99 and this Act without a legislative appropriation authorizing the  
25 expenditure of such excess funds.

26 **Section 23. Funds Available to Guam Cancer Trust Fund.**



1 (a) All funds available to the Guam Cancer Trust Fund in Fiscal  
2 Year 2021 and prior fiscal years shall not lapse and shall continue to be  
3 available to the Guam Cancer Trust Fund in Fiscal Year 2022.

4 (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of 11 GCA, Chapter 26, Article  
5 6, § 26603(e)(2)(B), all funds available to the Guam Cancer Trust Fund in  
6 Fiscal Year 2022 are not subject to the seventy-five percent (75%) allocation  
7 limitation imposed by said Section and may be expended for the purposes  
8 provided therein. All other provisions in 11 GCA, Chapter 26, Article 6, §  
9 26603(e)(2)(B), including the ten percent (10%) limitation on education and  
10 outreach, are not waived and continue to apply.

11 (c) All funds of the Guam Cancer Trust Fund are not subject to any  
12 transfer authority provided for in this Act or any other provision of law.

13 (d) The provisions of 11 GCA, Chapter 26, Article 6, § 26603(e)(6)  
14 are not waived.

15 **Section 24. Off-island Travel by Executive Security of the Guam Police**  
16 **Department.** The Guam Police Department is authorized to expend from its  
17 appropriation in this Act for off-island travel and per diem expenses for Police  
18 Officers assigned to Executive Security functions under the Guam Police  
19 Department for the purpose of providing executive security to *I Maga'hågan*  
20 *Guåhan*, the First Gentleman, and *I Sigundo Maga'låhen Guåhan* when traveling  
21 off-island to represent the people of Guam at meetings and functions determined  
22 critical to the welfare of Guam.

23 **Section 25. Access to the AS400 Financial Management System.**  
24 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, the Department of  
25 Administration shall provide Senators of the 36<sup>th</sup> Guam Legislature and the Office  
26 of Finance and Budget with read-only access to accounting and budget modules of  
27 the AS400 Financial Management System for all government of Guam agencies.

1           **Section 26.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, *I Maga'hågan*  
2 *Guåhan* is authorized to transfer up to Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000)  
3 from unrestricted appropriations in this Act to the Guam Housing Corporation for  
4 the sole and exclusive purposes of the *First-time Homeowner Assistance Program*  
5 contained in Article 7 of Chapter 4, Title 12 GCA. The provisions of this Section do  
6 not diminish any other transfer authority granted by this Act.

7           **Section 27. Allocation of American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 Funds**  
8 **Report.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, rule, or regulation, the Director  
9 of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research and the Director of  
10 Administration shall submit a written report to the Speaker of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*  
11 no later than five (5) working days after the end of each month in Fiscal Year 2022,  
12 which shall summarize the allocation of funds made available to the Governor of  
13 Guam through the *American Rescue Plan Act of 2021*. Failure to submit said report  
14 after the end of each month shall result in a fine of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars  
15 (\$250.00) per missed deadline for each director identified herein, which shall be  
16 deposited in the Rainy Day Fund established pursuant to Article 9 of Chapter 22,  
17 Title 5, Guam Code Annotated.

1 **CHAPTER XIV**

2 **SEVERABILITY**

3 **Section 1. Severability.** If any provision of this Act or its application to any  
4 person or circumstance is found to be invalid or contrary to law, such invalidity shall  
5 not affect other provisions or applications of this Act that can be given effect without  
6 the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Act are  
7 severable.
